

The A mistice Question Almost Settied - Montenegrin Successes -- Cardinal Antonelli Once More Dying.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Dispatches from Constantinople reports that the powers have telegraphed a note to Grura not to complicate the situation by assuming a warlike attitude.

VIENNA, Nov. 1. - Emperor Wi liam's speech produced an uncomfortable feeling here as indicating that the Trigh alliance is not firm.

LONDON, Nov. 1 .- The Post says i has reason to believe that only yesterday subsequent to the issue of the new Russian instructions, important peaceful telegrams were received from the principals concerned in the negotiations. It hopes notwithstanding appearances, that Gen Ignatieff has not | Sheridan's Business-Cases Against reverted to the original demand for a bare six week's armistice, which would only snatch he fruits of victory from Turkey and enable the Russians and Servians to enter upon a winter campaign. If the conditions are possible of acceptance as offered, we may feel certain the Porte will accept them. A few hours will show whether Russia means war. The above is prominently printed in the Post.
