FOREIGN.

Eastern Question Growing Threatening—Collision in the Ocean.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The latest reports of the situation at Constantinople say that the Porte's six week's armistice is considered counter to the proposition to Bosnia's attention.

The furniture of the Embassy have been prepared for shipment, and the Russian Consulate in the interior have been ordered to move within reach of the frontier.

LISBON, Nov. 2.—The United States frigate Vandalia collided with the Norwegian bark Atlantic, and stove in her bow and was towed into port. The Vandalia was uninjured.

DENVER, Nov. 2.—Webster Anthony is elected Speaker of the House. W. W. Webster, President pro tem of the Senate, was inaugurated Governor today.

Railroad Collision—Two Hurt.

ELIZABETH, Nov. 2.—The north bound passenger train on the Pennsylvania road was wrecked this morning near the Lenden depot. Two employees were probably fatally hurt.

NEW YORK.

The World's Denial—Fire—Tilden's Proclamation—Report of Chamber of Commerce—Resolution of Sympathy—Incendiary Explosion.

New York, Nov. 2.—The World denies that the matter represented as being taken from its columns of Oct. 20th, 1876, being circulated in circular form headed, "Read, Ponder and Reflect," throughout the Southern States, ever so appeared, and states that it is a bold and brazen forgery.

The Hudson glove factory of H. D. Simpson, at Chatham village, was burned today. Governor Tilden this morning issued a proclamation regarding the improper use of money at the election.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce this morning, Capt. Snow of the special committee on the question of the depth of water at Hallett Point, reported that the committee had held communication with Gen. Newton and had ascertained that the debris of the explosion was being rapidly cleared away.

The Congregational Association closes its report on Mr. Beecher as follows: AND WHEREAS, the preceding report of said committee indicates that there is no substantial ground for believing in the guilt of Mr. Beecher, be it therefore...

Resolved, That we do therefore as an association regard our brother as worthy of our confidence and have and express to him our sympathy in the severe trial through which he has passed.

RANDOLPH, Nov. 2.—The entire front of the residence of Augustus Supples in this city was blown out this morning at 8 o'clock, by a charge of powder which was placed in a window by some malicious person. The building was shattered and the furniture considerably damaged.

The Armistices Signed.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The Globe this morning announces that it understands that the foreign office has received information that an armistice was signed yesterday.

BELGRADE, Nov. 2.—The Serbian government has instructed Gen. Tobernayeff to send a flag of truce to Abdul Kerim, the Turkish Commander in Chief, to inquire whether he has been notified of the conclusion of armistice.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 2.—Three ice houses belonging to George Lags, and several stables and small outbuilding were destroyed by fire in Corondelet, yesterday afternoon. Loss estimated at \$20,000. Insurance \$4,000.

LOUISIANA.

Political Riot.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 2.—Gen. Auger, commanding the department, received a dispatch from Artesia, Miss., states that a meeting there yesterday ended in a free fight, and the wounding of six negroes, one of them mortally. The United States troops were called upon by the citizens, and their prompt appearance prevented further disturbances.
