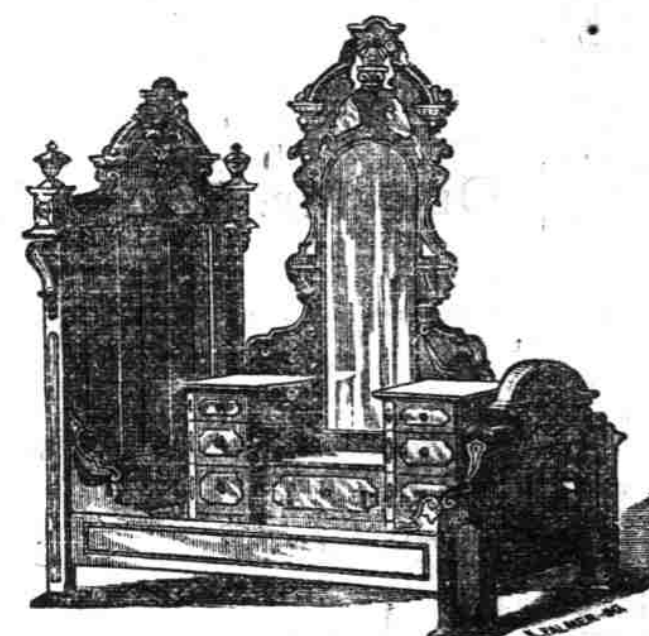

VICTORY!

A NATION REDEEMED.

"Ours are the Plans of Fair Delightful Peace; Unwarped by Party Rage to Live Like Brothers."

The "Solid South" Greets Her Northern Sisters, New York, Connecticut, and New Jersey, and Indiana, One of Her Children, in the Bonds of Fraternal Union, and Constitutional Government.

Although nearly confident of the great political victory which was achieved by the National Democratic party on Tuesday, the stoutest hearts were almost overcome by the depressing news which was flashed over the wires early yesterday morning.

Early in the day it was announced that Tilden still lacked one vote of a majority in the electoral college, and lists of the States, with the number of votes each had were eagerly and nervously consulted, but later bulletins to the OBSERVER and the "Griffith News Club" relieved the friends of reform of all suspense, and ultimately announced Gov Tilden's undoubted election, as will be seen by the following dispatches:

FLORIDA. LAKE CITY, Fla., Nov. 9, 1.45 p. m.—Twenty-one counties in Florida give 1711 Republican majority. Eighteen counties not heard from, but estimates based on the election of 1874, gives a Democratic majority of 1968, which will make the State Democratic by 255 majority.

MISSOURI. St. Louis, Nov. 9.—Complete returns from the 3rd Congressional District give it to Metcalf, Rep, by 31 majority. Democrats claim the 6th District for Morgan by 700 maj. This district was previously reported as probably for Haven, Rep. Republicans carry their county ticket in this county, except for Probate Judge. Public Administrator and Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Emil Thomas leads his ticket for Sheriff by 3500 maj. over Ex-Mayor Brown, and the remainder of the Republican candidates have an average majority of 1500.

ILLINOIS. CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Only additional Congressional news is that Tipton, Rep, has carried the 13th District, making a 4th Republican gain in the State. Sparks, Dem, has carried the 16th Dist, by a good majority. There is no reasonable foundation for claim that Democrats have carried Illinois. Careful comparison of returns received with the highest Democratic vote cast in 1872, indicate 20,000 Rep. majority. Gains of Republicans in Congressmen are exactly reverse to the present political character of the Illinois delegation. Two of these gains have been made in "Egypt," Democratic stronghold, and the Republicans have gained some members of the Legislature also, from that section.

NEW YORK. New York, Nov. 9.—An Express extra says it sees no reason to change the fact that a majority of the electoral votes are for Tilden and Hendricks. This, it says, is the voice of the people and nothing can change it but enormous frauds of Returning Boards, as in Louisiana in 1874.

PENNSYLVANIA. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9.—The election of Stinger, democrat to Congress, is claimed by 54 majority.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 9.—Western Union Bulletins gives Florida to the democrats by fifteen hundred majority. The Tribune in summing up the Congressional returns, says the democrats will have half their present majority.

Morrill is the only cabinet officer here. Cardinal McClosky will visit this city on the 22d inst. to attend the marriage of his niece Miss Teresa Mullen, of this city, and Hon. John Kelly of New York. Miss Mullen is a sister of Mrs. Francis D. Clary of this city. The ceremony will take place at St. Matthews church.

Best figures gives the democrats 27 majority in the next House. This estimate concedes to the republicans every reasonably doubtful district.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

CHARLESTON, Nov. 9, 7 p m.—Complete returns from Colleton, and partial from Charleston county, indicate that Hampton has carried South Carolina by from seventeen hundred to nineteen hundred majority. The democrats gain 7 Senators and 34 Representatives, giving them a sure majority of one on joint ballot, securing a United States Senator in place of Robertson. The vote for President is still closer, but the democratic committee are confident of a small majority for Tilden.

Nineteen counties, all official except four, give a democratic majority of 23,618. Eleven counties trustworthy reports, and some official, give republicans a majority of 14,159. Only two remaining counties, Charleston and Colleton, where before the election the republicans claimed respectively 6,000 and 500 majority. If the result confirms their anticipations, Hampton's net majority would be 2,954, and Tilden's probably 1,000, or 15 per cent. less. The city is in condition of feverish excitement to-day.

The indications are that both Aiken and Evans, democrats, are elected to Congress. We are not informed as to the other candidates.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The Western Union Telegraph Company has received the following dispatch:

LAKE CITY, Nov. 9, 5 p m.—Further returns from 21 counties in Florida, make the republican majority 1246, with 18 counties to be heard from, 16 of which gave a democratic majority in 1874 of 1968, at this rate the democratic majority in the State will be about fifteen hundred.

The Western Union Telegraph Company furnishes the following bulletin: LAKE CITY, Fla., Nov. 9, 9:30 p m.—Key West, Monroe county gives Tilden 987, Hayes 988; republican majority 1. Florida honestly estimated by democrats, gives 1720 majority at lowest possible figures. No boat yet.

ALABAMA.

MONTGOMERY, Nov. 9.—Enough returns show at least 35,000 majority for Tilden, and an unbroken delegation of democrats to Congress. Shelling, dem, in the 4th district has a handsome majority. Rapier and Haralson, negro divides the republican vote between them. This makes a gain of two democratic Congressmen.

SELMA, Nov. 9.—Shelling, democrat is elected to Congress by one hundred and seventy-seven majority, beating Haralson, colored the present member.

GEORGIA.

SAVANNAH, Nov. 9.—There is nothing later from Florida. Nothing is expected until the arrival of the St. John river steamer at Palatka.

There was but one interment to-day, yellow fever was the cause.

ATLANTA, Nov. 9.—Senator Jones, of Nevada is here and thinks Nevada will go democratic.

CALIFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—Returns from the interior has been very meagre during the day, and election of Congressmen in 3d and 4th districts not yet decided. Geo. O. Graham received a dispatch from Oregon this evening, signed by Senator Mitchell and Congressman elect Williams, stating that Senator Kelly concedes the State republican by 800 majority.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—A Virginia City dispatch says Hayes' majority certainly not less than 1,100; Republican Congressmen and Judge of the Supreme Court elected by perhaps 1,000.

ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Republicans gain 5 Congressmen in Illinois. The democrats elect the following: Harrison in the 2nd, Hunsate in the 10th, Knapp in the 11th, Springer in the 12th, Eden in the 13th, Harrison in the 17th, Townsend in the 19th and possibly Sparks in the 16th.

VIRGINIA.

RICHMOND, Nov. 9.—Hinton, dem, probably elected, making the Virginia delegation solid.

RICHMOND, Nov. 9.—A private telegram just received here from L. A. Wiltz, democratic candidate for Lieut Governor in Louisiana, says Louisiana has gone Democratic by 12,000.

A colored mob formed and marched down Broad street, to-night armed with clubs, &c. throwing stones and breaking in the windows of stores and dwellings. They marched to the residence of Rev J. W. Dungee, colored preacher, and stoned the house, breaking in the windows, &c. Subsequently a party of whites went to a negro hotel on Broad street, and served it in the same manner. All quiet now.

NORTH CAROLINA.

RALEIGH, Nov. 9.—Gen Kilpatrick arrived in this city this evening from Washington. He is now closeted with T. B. Keogh, chairman State Committee and other republicans at the Yarburo House. It is charged by Democrats that his presence in the State is for the purposes of perpetrating frauds upon the election returns. Additional returns from the Western part of the State continue to show democratic gains. The counties yet to hear from are Democratic and the majority will certainly reach 15,000. T. B. Keogh, chairman republican State Committee concedes the State by 12,000.

CONNECTICUT.

HARTFORD, Nov. 9.—The full vote of Connecticut for President is, Tilden 61,918, Hayes 58,929; Cooper 352, Smith 24.

Private and Reliable Dispatch.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 9. John Vandandingham, Secretary City News Club: A private dispatch says the Republicans in New York City concede Tilden's election and give him South Carolina and Florida.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7. For the South Atlantic States, northeast and West winds, slight changes in temperature and pressure, and partly cloudy or clear weather will prevail.
