### VICTORY PERCHES ON OUR BANNER.

### South Carolina Ours—Hampton Wades in and Tilden Follows.

### LOUISIANA BY 6,000—FLORIDA BY A GOOD MAJORITY—OREGON DOUBTFUL WITH CHANCES IN FAVOR OF DEMOCRATS

### The Only Hope of Republicans is to Defeat the Verdict of the Ballot Box by Fraudulent Returns.

### GRANT SEES IT AND ACTS.

### MASSACHUSETTS.

BOSTON, Nov 10.—Dean, democrat, is elected to Congress by official count.

### GEORGIA.

SAVANNAH, Nov 10.—Transportation has been ordered for troops to pass through for Florida. Advices from Florida say that the State has undoubtedly gone Democratic by two thousand majority, there has been no disturbances as far as heard from.

### OREGON.

WASHINGTON, Nov 10.—Senator Kelly telegraphs to-day to his wife in this city denying that he has conceded the State to the Republicans. He says the results in Oregon is doubtful, with the chances in favor of a small democratic majority.

### CALIFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov 10.—Returns from 20 counties in Oregon show a republican majority of 1,202. There remains but 3 more counties to be heard from, two of which will affect each other and the 3 will give fifty republican majority.

### INDIANA.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov 10.—72 counties in full show a democratic gain of 283 over the October election. The count to be heard from gave a net democratic majority of 5949, to which is to be added 114. The number of votes Tilden is now a head, making his probable majority 5463.

### GEORGIA.

AUGUSTA, Nov. 10.—United States troops have been ordered from South Carolina to Florida. Two companies stationed at Aiken leave this afternoon for Tallahassee.

ATLANTA Nov 10.—One company of infantry has been ordered from this place to Tallahassee, Fla., and several from South Carolina.

### OHIO.

COLUMBUS, Nov. 10.—Gen Wikoff, Chairman of the Republican State Committee, furnishes the following information: The sixty-nine counties of Ohio heard from up to noon to-day show a republican loss of 162 on Barnes' majority at the October election. The indications are that Hayes' majority will be about six thousand.

### FLORIDA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—A Western Union bulletin, dated Lake City, Nov 9.—midnight, says: the Jacksonville Press will issue a leader to-morrow, giving Florida a democratic majority of 1038, prepared by experienced men, and based on reliable returns and carefully computed estimates.

### ARKANSAS.

LITTLE ROCK, Nov 10.—The election of Congressmen in the 3d district is still in doubt between Cravens and McClurg, republicans. Only the official count can decide.

Company C, 14th United States Infantry, stationed here, was to-day ordered to New Orleans.

### WASHINGTON.

All demonstrations on the street have ceased. A feeling of sullen dissatisfaction seems to prevail among all parties.

The New York Tribune and Herald to-day have strong articles demanding that there be an honest count of the vote in Louisiana. The Herald says there must be no frauds in making the returns, but it must satisfy the honest fair minded men of both parties.

### NORTH CAROLINA.

WILMINGTON, Nov 10.—The excitement here to-day over the present aspect of the Presidential election is intense. At no time since the day of election has there been anything to approximate the deep feeling manifested this afternoon. The democrats claim that Tilden has been honestly elected, and if there is to be any trouble over the matter, the people of the North must decide the question. Republicans generally sustain the action of the President.

### LOUISIANA.

NEW YORK, Nov 10.—The Western Union Telegraph Company have received the following dispatch from New Orleans: Reports circulated North of rioting here are untrue. The city and State are perfectly quiet and business is proceeding as usual.

WASHINGTON, Nov 10.—Western Union Bulletins from New Orleans: With returns from all but six parishes the democrats claim four thousand majority. The six not heard from, in 1874 gave a democratic majority of over four thousand.

### NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov 10.—The Herald bulletin's full returns from 23 counties which give Florida to Hayes by nearly 5,000 majority. Republicans claim Hayes will carry the State by over 1,200.

A Herald special from St Louis says the United States Marshal has been notified that the President has signed McKee's pardon.

The Times figures Congress, Republicans, 143; Democrats, 147; to be elected 3. The Herald figures Democrats majority 25.

### LOUISIANA.

In the Interest of Peace—A Letter from Abram S Hewitt to Gov Ingersoll, Senator Bayard and Others

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The following dispatch has been sent to Gov Ingersoll, Hubbard Robinson, Bidle Curten, Palmer McCreary, Carroll and others, also Senators Thurman, Bayard, Randolph, McDonald, Keman, and other Senators, and to leading public men in Northern States, republicans and democrats; the acceptance warrant a full representation at New Orleans: Citizens at New Orleans urgently request that a delegation of prominent gentlemen come there at once to council peace and fair and honest returns. You are earnestly requested to be one of ten or fifteen gentlemen already known to meet at Louisville, Ga, house, Saturday evening, proceeding directly South or if more convenient meeting at the St. Charles Hotel, N. O., Monday evening. Your prompt acceptance by telegraph is requested. This emergency appeals to your patriotism.

### WASHINGTON.

Grant Sends His Tools Eye where, and for what?

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov 10.—Gen Sherman last night received telegrams from the Secretary of War, who is in Philadelphia, to order Gen Ruger to send as many companies of troops to Tallahassee, Fla., as could be spared, and to go himself in person. ### KILLED FOR OPINION'S SAKE.

Raleigh Excited over the Result of the Election.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 10.—A negro named Rufus Ferrell, who has invariably voted the Democratic ticket, disappeared from his home in this county, on Monday before the election and on Wednesday was found hanging dead in the neighborhood. The general impression is that he was killed for opinion's sake.

Returns continue to increase the Democratic majority in this State. It may reach 17000.

A painful anxiety in regard to the Presidential election is manifested in this city to-night, among those of both parties.

### SOUTH CAROLINA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The Associated Press has received the following from sources other than its regular agents: CHARLESTON, Nov. 10.—This county gives a Republican majority of 6,412.

Nearly all the counties heard from, officially or unofficially, give Hampton 1,218 majority. The Democratic Presidential ticket is not cut up as much as was at first supposed, and it is not believed that Tilden will fall more than four or five hundred behind Hampton. It does not appear possible for Republicans to overcome the figures above given from the counties not officially heard from.

Leading Republicans concede the State to Democrats by the returns, but say they will throw out enough Democratic counties to reverse result.

Latest revision of returns by News & Courier give South Carolina beyond all doubt to Tilden and Hendricks by 1,200 majority.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The following bulletin is posted at the Herald office: "Private dispatches, just received at the Democratic Headquarters says that Florida has gone Democratic."

Evening Post bulletin has the following: "The revenue collector at Jacksonville telegraphs that he is sure the State is Republican."

Watterson on the Situation in Louisiana.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 10.—The report that senators Beck, Henry Watterson and others have gone to New Orleans is premature. Mr. Watterson has not left this city, and in reply to inquiry, said, that if the parties mentioned should go to New Orleans, they would go in the interest of peace and order, hoping to exert their influence as far as possible over the excited masses now collected in that city. They could do no more in any event than to personally inform themselves. Mr. Watterson expressed the opinion that it would be eminently proper for Gov. Hayes and Gov. Tilden jointly, and by agreement, to send parties of friends to New Orleans, headed respectively by Chas. Francis Adams and Wm. M. Ewart, and composed of conservative men, who have the confidence of the country. He thought such an arrangement would be able to secure a fair count of the votes and satisfy the whole people and averting a most dangerous issue and outbreak.

### WASHINGTON.

### PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 10.

W T Sherman, Washington, D. C.:

Instruct Gen Auger in Louisiana and Gen Ruger in Florida, to be vigilant with the force at their command, to preserve peace and good order, and to see that the proper and legal boards of canvassers are unimpeached in the performance of their duties, should there be any ground of suspicion of fraudulent count on either side, it should be reported and denounced at once. No man worthy of office of President should be willing to hold it if counted in or placed there by fraud. Either party can afford to be disappointed in the result, the country cannot afford to have the results tainted by the suspicion of illegal or false returns.

Gen Sherman, Washington, D. C.:

Send all the troops to Gen Auger he may deem necessary to insure entire quiet and a peaceable count of the ballots actually cast. They may be taken from South Carolina, unless there is reason to suspect an outbreak there. The presence of citizens from other States, I understand is requested in Louisiana, to see that the board of canvassers make a fair count of the vote actually cast. It is to be hoped that representatives and fair men of both parties will go.
