

The Good News from Florida Confirmed.

The interest in the result of the National election in this city continued throughout the day yesterday. While Hamilton, of Maryland; Hon S'P Docno doubt was felt as to Gov. Tilden's little, of Wisconsin, ex-Senater ; Ex-L't election to the Presidency, the prospect of his being counted out by the returning boards of South Carolina, Florida and Louisiana, together with the object of sending troops to the two latter States, created no little anxiety. We regret that we are still unable to give the official votes of the doubtful States, but we feel confident that Mr. Tilden has been triumphantly elected as the successor to President Grant, and that nothing but the most stupendous frauds can cheat him out of a majority in the Electoral College. Quite a number of prominent gentlemen, as will be seen by the dispatches below, have gone to Louisiana to see the official count made, and we trust that nothing may occur there which will cause the blush of sheme to mantle the cheeks of any true American.
