THE SITUATION!

OBSERVER OFFICE, TUESDAY MORNING, NOV. 14, 76.

The situation about the Presidential contest up to the hour of going to press remains unchanged, and it is not likely that anything satisfactory will be known until the returning boards in the States of Louisiana, Florida and South Carolina have made their reports.

If, however, the latest news from Oregon, which places that State in the Democratic column, should prove to be correct, the contest over South Carolina, Florida and Louisiana will be virtually at an end, as the republicans in those States could no longer expect to accomplish anything by defrauding the people of those States out of their hard earned victory for Democracy and reform.

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Great Destruction of Life by a Cyclone. LONDON, Nov. 13.—The dispatches from Calcutta estimate the loss of life by the cyclone to be 40,000. Calcutta itself narrowly escaped. There are reports of a famine from Bombay.

A Berlin correspondent of the Times says the Russian papers abound with warlike reports. It is announced that Russia is likely to obtain from Holland money for a large amount of railway shares.

A Vienna correspondent of the Times confirms the report that the Russian army will be mobilized in a few days. Russia will send a note to the Powers that the reforms demanded by all can only be fulfilled by Turkey, if Russia prepares to defend them.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Dispatches received by the National Democratic Committee last night from New Orleans, say the situation is unchanged.

The Herald still gives Hayes 106 electoral votes, and Tilden 184, with 19 doubtful. It says referring to doubtful States, so far as additional detailed returns go, they point as before to Democratic success. The Herald's New Orleans' special of the 12th, says United States Marshal Pitkin, telegraphed Gen Sherman to night, asking his presence here, and thinks he will come. The Times says its dispatches from Florida, Louisiana and South Carolina, confirm previous reports, that they have been carried by republicans. The Times' Washington dispatch says Sherman had a long interview with the President Sunday night, under orders to take command at New Orleans, and make such disposition of troops as will secure public peace in any emergency. The Times quotes Secretary Cameron: "The action of the President in the premises has been taken to insure a fair return and to furnish the people of the country with satisfactory evidence that the verdict of Tuesday, whatever it may be declared, has been free from frauds."

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13. For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, falling barometer, southwest winds and cloudy rainy weather will prevail, with slight changes in temperature, followed at the western stations, by rising barometer and cold northerly winds.

FOREIGN.

Death of Pope Pius IX

LONDON, Nov 13.—Chief Justice Cockburn delivered judgment in Greece vs. Ferdinand Keyer, of the German steamer Francona, convicted of manslaughter, for running down an English vessel on the high sea. The conviction must be quashed for want of jurisdiction.

The Cologne Gazette publishes a report which has been presented to the King of Italy by his ministers, regarding the measures to be taken by the Italian government at the death of his Holiness. The ministers propose immediately after the Pope's death to occupy the neighborhood of the Vatican by military. The Prefect of Rome will request certain Papal officials to assist at viewing the body and other necessary formalities. If this be refused the Prefect will forcibly enter the Vatican accompanied by Querster and also by Physicians, notaries and witnesses who after viewing the body will send a certificate of inquest to Cardinal Devean. A seal will be attached to the furniture in the Pope's department and remain so until after the removal of the body. After twenty four hours the body will be at the disposal of the clergy.

During the hurricane at Lisbon the Greek bark run down in the channel and eight of the crew were drowned.

The Pall Mall Gazette of this afternoon in a leading article says: Once more darkness has fallen over the prospects of peace and that it will be lifted again we may hope, but the news that comes both from St Petersburg and Constantinople gives us warning that what is called feeling may yet conquer wisdom; and that a certain degree of insanity already threatens to creep into the judgment of those upon whom depends the tremendous issue of peace or war. The speech of the Czar is not the most alarming incident of the time, but is far from pleasant reading.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Democrats Protest—The Canvassers.

CHARLESTON, Nov. 13.—The Democrats to-day filed a protest against the late election in Charleston county. They allege that the whole county was controlled by intimidation and terrorism, and that no opportunity to vote was given the qualified voters; also that large numbers who desired to do so were prevented from voting Democratic ticket; also that the legal number of polls was not opened.

COLUMBIA, Nov. 13.—The board of canvassers heard the argument to-day regarding their duties and powers. The argument will be continued to-morrow.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Senator Logan declines to go to New Orleans, as the question might come before the Senate. Hon C P Farrell, J M Beardsy, a lawyer of Rock Island, and Messrs Taylor and Haven, merchants of Chicago, have gone from here to New Orleans.

NEW YORK.

A Culprit Suicides.

WATERTOWN, Nov 13.—Francis Grafst, convicted of murder in 2d degree sentence deferred that he might dispose of twenty thousand dollars worth of property belonging to him, hanged himself in his cell.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—Vermont it appears has elected a postmaster member of the Electoral College. The Constitution declares a Federal office-holder to be ineligible. Secretary Chandler returned from Philadelphia with the President this morning.

The Navy people expect the Franklin Thursday.

The President has requested D H Cartter Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Columbia to go to Columbia, S. C. to be present at the canvass of the vote.

The President has pardoned Wm O Avery. The friends of McKee are confident he will be pardoned in a few days.

The President appointed Barbour Lewis of Tenn, Register of Land Office.

Salt Lake City, Utah. Captain Franklin of the United States steamer, Franklin, telegraphs Secretary Roberson from St. Thomas, that the Franklin would sail immediately after coaling—all well.

Gen Sherman dined with the President yesterday. The President stated in invitation that he wished to see him in a matter having no reference to military or political matters.

The President telegraphed Sheridan yesterday afternoon he thought it advisable for him to go to New Orleans, for which place Sheridan started immediately.
