

The Times says: This mornings view opers so fairly, that we are perhaps led to be too sanguine in holding that peace is assured. It is hard to believe that when ten persons all representing powers deeply interested in keeping peace meet in council they will not maintain peace unbroken.

#### WASHINGTON.

Troops Arriving and More Expected -They will Probably Police the District Until After the Presidential Inauguration.

Washington, Nov 20. - Several companies of soldiers have arrived here and others are coming. This is made the basis for sensational paragrapes, about massing the army in this district. There are assurances that these troops are merely enroute, and their movements have no strategetic or political significance. It is likely however as the district has no local government, that the army will police fourth of March.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 .- The Times' New Orleans dispatch says: It will be remembered that the returning board was created by the same legislature that elected Pinchback to the United States Senate. He was refused his seat on the ground that the Legislature was not properly and legally organized. Now he claims that as the returning board is recognized as a legal body, he should be seated.


