FOREIGN. Prospects of War—Movement of Troops, &c. LONDON, Nov 21.—Mr Cross, Home Secretary at the banquet spoke hopefully of the aspect of the Eastern affairs, and thought the Conference would meet before the end of the week.

LONDON, Nov 21.—Representatives of the Porte abroad have been instructed to make known its resolution that the Sultan neither could, nor would, in any circumstances consent to the occupation of the Turkish territory even by the most friendly power.

BRUSSELS, Nov 21.—The government of Belgium has received a communication from the Belgium Consul at Malta announcing that the Malta authorities had informed the Chamber of Commerce that torpedoes had been placed at the approaches to the ports of Odessa, Kerch, Sebastopol and Etschakoff.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov 21.—Dispatch from Semlin announces that the Serbian ministry have refused the demand of General Tchernayeff to be admitted into the Cabinet, declaring that if he entered, they would resign.

FLASHES. NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—John Kelly married this morning to Miss Teresa Muller, niece of Cardinal McClosky. The wedding was very quiet. The ceremony was performed by the Cardinal.

ATLANTA, GA., Nov 21.—Hon A H Stephens is here, on his way to Washington. His health is much improved.

HARRISBURG, PA., Nov 21.—The official vote of Pennsylvania gives Hayes 384,148, Tilden 366,204, Cooper 7,204.

TORONTO, Nov. 21.—Hamilton's foundry and car works were burned to-day. Loss three hundred thousand.
