

The news from South Carolina, Florida and Louisiana is so meagre as to leave the political situation unchanged in those three States. The Democrats in South Carolina are contesting their rights in that State, inch by inch, before the Supreme Court, and feel confident of success. The Republicans on the contrary claim that the action of the returning board is final, and that there is no appeal from their decision. Governor Hampton has issued an address, which we publish in another column, counseling moderation, and a patience submission to the execution of the

NEW YORK, Nov 23 .- The Times says the South Carolina board of canvassers recognized somewhat late their mistake in submitting their action to the review and control of the Supreme of a rectification of the international BUCKWHEAT Court.
