Noon Dispatches. NEW YORK.

The Infamous Action of the Returning Board of South Carolina. Upheld by the Times--The World and Herald Warmly Denounce It--The Franklin at Last.

The World says: The Board of Canvassers yesterday, stole the electoral vote of that State, openly from the Supreme Court, with the avowed object of offering it to Hayes.

The Herald says: This is very sharp practice, and if the Supreme Court cannot support its authority, which the board have defied, the State must be counted for Hayes.

SANDY HOOK, Nov. 23--10:50 A.M.--The Franklin is now lying off the light ship. There is a government steamer going off to her.

FOREIGN.

Russia's Hundred Million Rubles Already Exhausted by War Expenses--The Seizure of the Montezuma to be Punished.

LONDON, Nov. 23.--The hundred million rubles which Russia is now raising has already been consumed by military expenses.

MADRID, Nov. 23.--A dispatch to the Daily News: The Spanish government has determined to execute the men who seized the steamer Montezuma, whenever captured.

The marriage between King Alfonso and the daughter of the Duke De Montpensier, is now reported as definitely arranged.

GEORGIA.

The Yellow Fever Over. SAVANNAH, Nov. 23.--The epidemic here is over, and travellers need fear no danger in coming to or passing through this city on their way to Florida or any points South.

NORFOLK, Nov. 23.--The schooner Dolly Varden, from New York for Cape Haytien, is here in distress.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.--Tweed landed from the Catapa at pier 4 North river.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Great Excitement, But no Violence--What Democrats Will Do--One of the Board Resigns to Escape Writ of Court.

COLUMBIA, Nov. 23.--Considerable excitement is reported throughout the State, but no demonstration of violence or lawlessness. The action of the board of State canvassers is considered final by the republicans, while the democrats claim it has no effect.

FOREIGN.

The Crisis Approaching--Comments of English Papers--Heavy Failure.

LONDON, Nov. 23.--A Belgrade dispatch to the Daily News, says that the crisis seems approaching in Eastern affairs. The Russians are coming in great numbers.

The Times' editorial says: We enter into the conference of Powers with something more than hope of peace. For the attainment of peace we shall support any proposals that offer guarantee of an orderly government.

NEW YORK.

What a Republican Paper Thinks of the Situation in South Carolina.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.--The Post says: "The best thing the South Carolina board of canvassers can do, is to reassemble. The country will not be satisfied with the proceedings which look like sharp practice.

LOUISIANA.

Orders Made to Return Democratic Parishes withheld by Republicans.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 23.--The board met, committees present. Judge Spoford, counsel, for the Democratic candidates filed a statement that the returns of Supervisors for fourteen parishes not received by the board had been in the city some time in the hands of Republican Supervisors.

GENERAL SHERMAN ON THE CRISIS.

A Washington dispatch, dated November 16th, says: General Sherman, in an interview to-day, said: "Everything is very quiet in the South. All the rifle clubs have dispersed, so far as I can hear. I do not apprehend any trouble from the Southern people. They are all quiet and law-abiding, and apparently disposed to be guided by their friends at the North."

"No," said Sherman briefly, blowing a great cloud of smoke in his most energetic fashion, "our country is too young to die that way." "But," said the philosopher of "Fallen Empires," "don't you think our safety lies in doing away with our present system and building a more secure form of government, like the English?"
