NOON DISPATCHES. WASHINGTON.

Chamberlain's Pleasure to Govern the Disposition of Troops in South Carolina—Why Judge Bond is Now in Columbia—Warlike Indications in Europe.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 27.—Grant writes Cameron that Chamberlain is now beyond controversy Governor of South Carolina, and remains so, until a new Governor is legally inaugurated, and directs him to sustain Chamberlain against domestic violence until otherwise ordered.

WASHINGTON. Habeas Corpus Case Before the Supreme Court—Writ Denied—Postponed on Account of the Weather.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—The Supreme Court on motion for habeas corpus on behalf of Henderson and others from New Orleans, seeking to take applicants out of prison in West Virginia, on the ground that they were convicted in Louisiana and West Virginia, had never assented to use her prisons for the confinement of Federal prisoners, the writs were denied.

SOUTH CAROLINA. Plot of the Conspirators Developing—The Bayonet to Rule the Hour.

COLUMBIA, Nov. 26.—On application for writs of habeas corpus the board of State Canvassers were brought this morning into the United States Circuit Court, Judges Bond and Bryan presiding.
