SENATE.

NINTH DAY. FRIDAY, Dec. 1.

The Senate was called to order at 11 A. M., Mr. President Robinson in the chair.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. Mr. Folk from the committee on the judiciary, resolution of instruction to the judiciary committee in reference to the powers of the General Assembly, to extend the time of sheriffs to collect and settle taxes, asked to be discharged from its further consideration.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS. Consideration of the bill fixing the price of public printing. Question being as to the proposition of Mr. Robins, to amend by striking out 75 cents and insert 60 cents, and \$1.50 and insert \$1.20.
