



The November report of the Charleston Exchange on the South Carolina cotton crop based on fifty replies from 25 counties is as follows: Weather reported by 33 more favorable, by 15 as the same, and by 2 less favorable than the same month last year. The crop of the State may be regarded as gathered, 34 report picking as finished at the date of their replies; 16 say from 85 per cent to 95 per cent already picked, and that all would be gathered by the 15th. The average of replies show a decrease in yield in counties heard from of 16 per cent compared to last years proportion of crop already sent to market from 50 to 90 per cent. The average is 76 per cent. The drought in August, and the early frost in Oct. are reported as having reduced the crop from 25 to 33 per cent, and the present condition of the country is causing it to be marketed more rapidly than usual.
