SOUTH CAROLINA.

THE SENATORIAL CONTEST.

Gen M C Butler the Democratic Favorite, and D T Corbin the Republican.

MOORE TROOPS.

COLUMBIA, Dec 12.—In the ballot today in the Democratic House for United States Senator, there were fourteen candidates. The vote ranged from 1 to 11, which was the highest cast for Gen M C Butler of Edgefield.

In the Republican House the ballot for United States Senator resulted in the election of United States District Attorney D T Corbin, 58 out of 66 cast being for him.

WASHINGTON.

Robertson Refuses to be Elected—The Report of the Louisiana Democratic Committee to be Printed—Democrats Determined to Maintain Their Rights.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec 12.—The Herald's special from Columbia publishes the correspondence in which Senator Robertson declines being a candidate for re-election.

In the Senate, Mr Boggs now presented a memorial of himself, Senators Stevenson and McDonald, embracing the report of the Democratic Committee, which witnessed the count by the returning board in Louisiana, and it was ordered printed.

The friends of the new steamboat bill are represented by some of their best men, urging Sherman or Morton, to call up their measure. They have some hope of early action.

The House Judiciary Committee voted to recommend the admission of Belford from Colorado, 7 to 3; Munton, Ashe and Hurd voted nay, and will make a minority report.

The House is discussing joint rules. The question came up on a motion to take action Bland's silver bill.

FOREIGN.

A Peaceful Solution of the War Question Probable—France Still Troubled by the Ministerial Squabbling—Peace Restored in the Argentine Republic.

LONDON, Dec 12.—The Times' Vienna dispatch reports a greatly improved feeling on the part of Turkey.

PARIS, Dec 12.—President MacMahon at Saturday's Cabinet council, said: "I will never consent to part with the war minister. I will not give up the army and its organization which are the very security of the country to the hazards of politics, which might at any moment overturn what has just been done, and compromise the country's recovery forever."

LONDON, Dec 12.—The Argentine consul has received a telegram from the Argentine Finance Minister, announcing that the rebellion Entre Rios has terminated, and that the Republic is peaceful.

ILLINOIS.

Democratic Meeting in Chicago—The House Must Be Sustained.

CHICAGO, Dec 12.—Prominent Democrats of this city held a largely attended meeting here this evening to discuss the political situation.

MICHIGAN.

Another Unconstitutional Elector.

DETROIT, Dec 12.—Democratic lawyers are preparing proofs and authorities that Michigan cast only ten votes for Hayes, on account of the irregularities regarding Burton Hauckey, who was United States Commissioner when elected.

OHIO.

Gov Hayes Won't Express an Opinion.

CINCINNATI, Dec 12.—Gov Hayes in responding to a serenade after expressing thanks said: "You could not expect me to say much more. You could not expect me to speak of political matters on this occasion, and certainly not of the position which affairs have assumed at the present time."

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Naval Stations—Mr Hewitt to be Investigated—Gen Hancock the Ke- main in Command of the Department of the Atlantic.

WASHINGTON, Dec 12.—The Board of Naval officers appointed to report regarding navy yard, favor retaining all navy yards and stations except the yard at New London, naval ground at Brunswick, Ga. They speak favorably of Port Royal as undoubtedly the finest harbor on the Southern coast.

CONGRESS.

A Lion in the Path and His Name is Samuel J Randall the Present Speaker of the House—Debate in the Senate on the Presidential Question.

WASHINGTON, Dec 12.—Most of today's session in the house was occupied in the discussion of the important questions as to whether the joint rules of the two Houses, and including the rule for the counting of the Presidential votes are, or are not in force.

Mr Morton again opposed the measure, and said the Senate was called upon to re-enact by its electoral college

with all its faults, and also the provisions of the constitution, authorizing the House of Representatives to elect a President, which was a dangerous one in his opinion.
