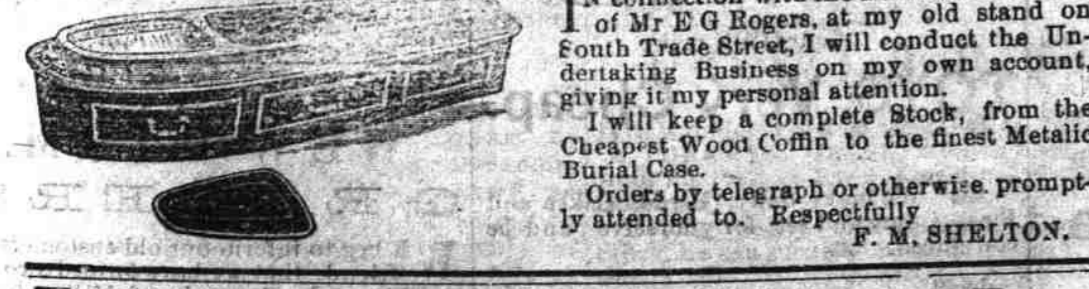

FOREIGN. A Peaceful Solution of the Eastern Question More Apparent—Escobedo not Killed, and now With Diaz.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The Renter's Telegram Company have the following from Paris: It is officially announced here that the Armistice has been prolonged until the 1st of March.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 30.—At Thursday's sitting of the conference, which lasted four hours, it was decided that the Armistice should be prolonged until the 1st of March, 1877.

Discussion followed on those questions, in which Count Chandary, the French plenipotentiary, took the leading part. The next sittings of the conference will be on Saturday and Monday, and it is expected that rapid progress will be made with the deliberations.

Apprehensions recently entertained of an unfavorable issue are now considerably diminished and a pacific solution of the pending questions is anticipated.

The British fleet has left Bisika Bay for the Piranes. The Pall Mall Gazette of this afternoon states that the proposal for a prolongation of the armistice was made by the Porte, and considers that this action adds much to the hopefulness of the situation.

SENATORS BLAINE AND CONKING WILL ABJURE PARTY IN THE INTEREST OF A FAIR COURT.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 30.—Counterfeit half dollars, supposed to have been cast from dies captured from the New Orleans mint, reach here from the South.

THE House adjourned to-day till Wednesday without business. SENATE—No session.

MASSACHUSETTS. Sharp Practice Among Cotton Brokers.

BOSTON, Dec. 30.—In 1873 Henry C. Thatcher, cotton broker of this city paid \$6,300 on drafts made by Dickinson Bros, of Memphis, Tenn. Bills of lading attached to drafts were it alleged fictitious, and Thatcher had the Dickinsons arrested by Boston detectives on a requisition issued by Gov Rice, of Massachusetts.

THE Governor of Tennessee now releases the Dickinsons on the ground that they cannot be tried in Massachusetts for an offence committed in Tennessee.

LOUISIANA. The Committee Still at Work Among the "Bull Dozers."

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 30.—The Senate Committee is engaged in hearing Republican testimony in regard to "bull-dozing" in Ouachita, and the Senate sub-committee in relation to East Baton Rouge. The interest in the investigation has abated considerably, owing to a surfeit of contradictory testimony, and the approaching struggle of the parties for the control of the State government.

FLORIDA. Congressional Committee at Work.

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 30.—The Senate Committee still in session here. No important developments. The sub-committees of the House have not yet returned. The Republican leaders here give up the State to Drew.

ASHES. QUISSVILLE, Dec. 30.—Seven unknown men from Utipio, O., were drenched in a baking ice gorge in Ohio.

PENNSYLVANIA, Dec. 30.—The steamer Vivia, hence for Arleston, has broken her shaft and turned for repairs.

PORTLAND, ME., Dec. 30.—There is no strike on the Grand Trunk Railroad, this side of Island Pond. Trains run as usual.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 30.—Drug Company's warehouse destroyed. Loss \$60,000.

CANADA. Strike of Railroad Engineers.

TORONTO, Dec. 30.—The long threatened strike of engineers in the employ of the Grand Trunk Railroad last night became an accomplished fact. Pending the making arrangements for resumption, all trains have been cancelled. Freight trains all cancelled at 6 o'clock yesterday evening, in anticipation of the strike. Now no less than 15 of them on siding between this city and Stratford. Meanwhile every effort is being made to secure the services of competent engineers to place the business on normal basis.

THE train from Montreal was abandoned a few miles East of Coburg last night. The passengers, 60 in number, were conveyed to Coburg in sleighs. This morning the engines and cars encumber the line at intervals. There is said to be a large quantity of live stock in the abandoned cars. The severe snow storm subsided this morning.
