



NEW YORK, Jan 5 .- A New Orleans special to the Herald dated Jan. 4, says the Republicans are enrolling militia daily, and Gen Lengstreet, who arrived yesterday will be in command. An executive order has been issued on the the State Treasurer to pay no more money out of the interests, school and general funds-all present funds held subject to order for defensive purpos s.
