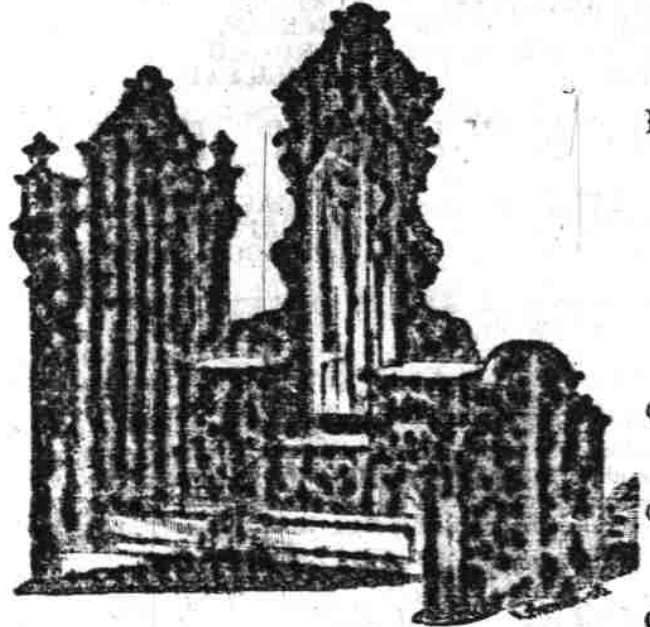

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Neon Dispatches. WASHINGTON.

Petition to the Senate from Prominent Business Men in Cincinnati of Both Parties—Florida Committee Make no Minority Report on the Florida Election—Democratic Mass Meeting.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan 8.—In the Senate, Mr Sherman presented a petition of prominent business men and members of both political parties, asking an amicable settlement of the Presidential contest.

The action of the Cabinet yesterday meets quite general approval. The Florida Committee has returned. There will be no minority report on the State election.

The Judiciary Committee of the House have taken no action regarding the telegraphic dispatches. The Committee on Privileges and Elections are still after the \$8,000 supposed to have been sent to the Oregon electors, without result.

The people are flocking to Ford's Opera House to attend the Democratic mass meeting about to organize. House unimportant.

FOREIGN. Superior Powers Determined to Force an Acceptance of their Propositions by the Porte if Possible—The Porte Weakening.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan 8.—It is clear and well defined that the European Governments have instructed their representatives in conference to refuse to consider Midhat Pasha's constitution, and to present on Monday what is really European ultimatum. The powers are very determined, and undoubtedly mean to try to force the Porte to accept their proposals.

LONDON, Dec 8.—The various special dispatches as to the probable attitude of the Porte at to-day's sitting of the conference are conflicting. A Peru special to the Daily Telegraph dated Sunday, says the Porte is apparently still determined to make no further concessions.

NEW JERSEY. Strike Among the Potters.

TRENTON, Jan 8.—This morning all the employees of the Trenton Potteries left their work in consequence of a general reduction of 20 per cent of their wages. They number 1,500 persons and are now holding an excited meeting.

LONG BRANCH, Jan 8.—The American had a strong passage. A violent westerly gale prevailed all the way until very near our shore, when the weather thickened and the wind changed to East.

NEW YORK, Jan 8.—The Louisville forger Brent has arrived. He is the first prisoner surrendered by Great Britain since the adjustment of the extradition treaty. Dispatches from Newark, Port Jarvis, and Hartford report that much danger was done by the sleet at Port Jarvis. Another ice gorge is feared.

Mid-Night Dispatches. WASHINGTON.

Interesting Proceedings in Congress—Florida Committee Arrived—One Republican Member will Join in Report that Tilden Carried the State—Why the Other Member Thinks There are Thieves in Florida—Examination of the Oregon Elector.—May and Bennett Disappeared.—A Blatant Article.

WASHINGTON, Jan 8.—House.—The Select Committee on the Powers and Privileges of the House in regard to the counting of the electoral vote were instructed to inquire whether any electoral votes were cast by United States officials or by persons laboring under political disabilities, and what ought to be done with them.

A select committee was ordered to inquire into the corrupt and improper conduct of the Board of Police Commissioners of Washington. A bill passed abolishing the board and transferring its duties to the district commissioners.

A resolution requiring the Judiciary Committee to report within two days a constitutional amendment, prohibiting the payment of War Claims to any but loyal persons, failed for want of two thirds majority, 110 to 65.

The Star says: The Committee of the House which has been investigating the recent election in Florida, returned here this morning. The Committee will not hold a meeting for a few days. It is said that Representative Woodburn, one of the Republican member of the Committee will unite in a report with the Democrats that the Tilden and Hendricks electors honestly carried the State.

SOUTH CAROLINA. Tax-Payers Endorse Hampton.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 8.—A mass meeting of tax payers in this county, took place to-day. There was a large attendance and resolutions were unanimously adopted to recognize Hampton as Governor, Simpson Lt Governor, and only such county officers as appointed by them, and cheerfully pay twenty-five per of last year's tax, and levy on the approaching tax under Hampton's Government. This action is fortified by previous decisions of the Supreme Court.
