

Washington, DC, Jan 11-The greater part of the amount of claims for the proceeds of captured and abandoned statute, were ascertained by judgments and the recoveries of claimants. The motion was granted in 1,190 cases, and 1,217 were dismissed by the consent of claimants. The aggregate of claims thus disposed of was \$13,138,786.
