TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.**Neon Dispatches.****FOREIGN.**

The Turkish Question as far from a Settlement as Ever—Don Carlos in Constantinople.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—A Reuter telegram from Constantinople says that Ignatius declared on Saturday, after the conference, if the Porte should disregard the armistice or take any action hostile to Montenegro or Servia, or if the Christian inhabitants of Turkey should be subjected to any hardships, Europe would treat such proceedings as provocation, and would consider what course ought to be pursued. All plenipotentiaries were assembled at the Austrian Embassy, and signed the final protocol of the conference.

The Chinese Embassy has arrived at Southampton.

Viscount Gage, of Ireland, is dead. Don Carlos is reported at Constantinople.

The Berlin correspondent of the Times telegraph that Russia is beginning to represent to the Powers that the demands of the conference having been rejected, it devolves upon Europe to take more forcible proceedings. Should Europe find it impossible to agree on joint action, Russia will be able to declare that the failure of the conference is the defeat of Europe, not of Russia.

WASHINGTON. Jan. 22.—What the Senate is Doing—House Idles.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.—In the Senate during the morning hour, Mr. Merrimon spoke in opposition to sending the committee of the Senate away from the city to take testimony. He said the result of sending the committee away was to deprive the States of representation. Recently the State of Wisconsin was without representation on the floor of the Senate, when questions of great importance were being considered.

Morrison of the Louisiana Committee is examining United States Marshal Pitkin of Louisiana, with closed doors. The Committee on Privileges and Elections of the Senate continue the Mississippi investigation. The Committee on the Privileges and Powers of the House excused General Anderson until to-morrow. Mr. Paterson testified that he had collected twenty-five thousand dollars from government employees for election purposes.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Hundreds Thrown Out of Employment by the Weather.

LEVANTON, Jan. 22.—Twenty-five hundred men are kept out of employment at the ship yard in this place, owing to the inclemency of the weather. There are nine new steamships under contracts.

NEW YORK.

Fight on a Steamship—Appointed of a Reforce—Arrest of an ex Federal Officer.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The firemen and sailors of the steamship Montague had a quarrel and fight, in which several were severely wounded. The officers had a difficulty in quelling the fight.

Wm. Allen Butler was appointed referee of the Continental Insurance Company.

Henry M. Williams, ex-Deputy Collector was arrested for complicity in the Lawrence smuggling frauds. Lawrence has agreed to tell all he knows.

Williams claims his arrest a job on the part of District Attorney Bliss, for lobbying at Washington against his re-appointment.

FOREIGN.

More About the Conference.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 22.—The European Powers visited Michal Pasha, Grand Vizier and Safo Pasha, minister of foreign affairs, to-day, to prevent their charges of affairs. The Marquis de Saulny left Constantinople to-day.

WASHINGTON.

Grant Approves the Electoral Bill—Morton Opposes it and Breaks Down—Grant Justifies Sending Troops and Regrets He Couldn't Send More.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22.

The President is reported as speaking strongly in favor of the electoral bill, and has expressed his determination to sign it, should it pass.

Before the Privileges and Powers Committee Gen. Judson Kilpatrick testified he took with him to North Carolina a letter from Chandler, that he had confidence in the National Republican Committee, and was worth a consideration with one hundred dollars for expenses—had no instructions to use money or improper means to influence the result of the election.

HOUSE.—A message from the President was laid before the House in response to the resolution calling for copies of orders given for the use of troops in Virginia, Louisiana, and Florida, during the election. Copies of orders were transmitted with the message. The President defends his action as being simply in the performance of his duty under the Constitution and laws, and says if he had had more troops at his disposal, he would have stationed them so as to prevent violation of the election laws in those States, and also in Alabama, Mississippi and Georgia. Word of New York, moved to refer the matter to a select Committee of eleven to inquire whether there has been any unwarrantable exercise of authority for which the President is justly responsible. A vote on the resolution was prevented by parliamentary devices. It comes up as unfinished business to-morrow.

SENATE.—Mr. Morton spoke an hour when ill health interrupted him. He maintained the President of the Senate had power to count the vote—claimed that Hayes was elected, and declared the bill was yielding to the Democrats. Frelinghuysen followed, arguing the constitutionality of the bill.

Cameron of Pennsylvania, said it appeared as a Democratic measure. Edmunds said he would press the bill to a vote to-morrow evening, if the Senate would have to give one night to the counting. Adjourned.

Confirmations: Benj. H. Lanier, Collector 2nd District of Louisiana.

The Democratic caucus of the House did nothing definite. The caucus is to be called again at the discretion of Col. Lamar, Chairman, when the Democratic Senators will be invited to participate. The bill is approved by the regular joint committee of both Houses and the Senate caucuses, and it is positively asserted will become a law.
