NEW ORLEANS, Nov 20, '76. My Dear Sir: You fully understand the situation. Can you advise with me thereto?

J. MADISON WELLS. Pickett testified that the gentleman whom he well knew called on him, on November 23rd, just from New Orleans He told witness the exact situation in New Orleans.
