## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

### Noon Dispatches.

WASHINGTON. Florida Vote Unsettled—Further Testimony of Maddox—Louisiana Voted a Majority for Tilden as Fair as Would Be.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 2. In the Electoral Commission this morning, Congressman Field spoke in support of his objection to the count of the Republican vote of Florida.

Before the Committee of Powers and Privileges, Maddox testified that he did not approach Eicket and Gen Walker until after his interview with Secretary Cameron. No proposition had been made by witness to deliver Wells' West letter for money consideration. He required further time for the production of the letter. The letter is in the hands of a prominent Republican. Witness is allowed until to-morrow to produce it. Witness was willing to give the present location of the letter, but the Committee by vote refused to receive the information, as witness said it would endanger its production. Maddox went to New Orleans to examine the canvass for himself, and felt satisfied that the vote of the State had been cast for Tilden, the election having been as fair as any could be. Witness delivered the letter from Wells to Gen Grant, which was intended for submission to the Cabinet. Wells wanted protection in the discharge of his duty. The President said Wells should receive such protection—that he wanted a fair count. The Committee then went into Maddox's personal affairs. The House met at 10, and still continues. Yesterday's session bill is pending to enable the House and Senate to break the perpetual session, so as to give regular days for legislation. Under the present electoral law, all legislation will bear the date of Thursday, until the count is completed.

SENATE.—During the morning hour a passed bill was reported by the Committee on Finance, for the punishment of persons making or having in possession dies moulds &c., for the manufacturing of counterfeit coin. Mr Ingalls of Kansas, introduced a bill to enable Indians to become citizens of the United States, and it was referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs.

### NEW YORK.

Another Confession of Murder—The Crime Eight Years Old.

New York, Feb. 2.—The Grand Jury yesterday, presented an indictment against Theodore R Wetmore, Vice President of the Security Life Insurance Company for embezzlement and grand larceny, also Robert L Case, President, Robert M Case, Jr, actuary, and Isaac H Allen, Secretary, for perjury. Judge Gildersleve immediately issued a bench warrant for the arrest of all the above named, which was placed in the hands of officers for service. Mr Wetmore did not sign the annual statement of the Company, and no indictment could be found against him for perjury, as in the case of the other officials, who affix their signature to false statements. Mr Allen was at the office of the Security Company yesterday as usual, and will not make any efforts he states to avoid arrest. He has made provisions for bail when the time comes. The other officers of the Company have not been seen about the office for some time.

A Bloomington, Illinois dispatch reports that a man named John Pierson, in jail there, has confessed that he murdered the Hon Murry McConnell, at Jacksonville, Indiana, February 1869. Mr. McConnell was found in his office with his head crushed.

### FOREIGN.

Spain and the United States on the Treaty of 1795—Russia not Satisfied—Wants to Know if she can Keep What she Gains by War with Turkey.

London, Feb 2.—The Times Berlin dispatch says: Serbia is willing to raise the fortifications at Deligrade and Alcinatz if Turkey leaves other fortifications in her hands. The mobilization of the Russian guards is resolved upon. A brisk correspondence is proceeding between Russia and Germany. Russia wants to know whether she could enjoy the fruits of a victory, if she achieves one.

MADRID, Feb 2.—Spain and the United States are negotiating the revision of the treaty of '95, securing civil trials in Cuba, unless taken in armed rebellion.

### KENTUCKY.

Kentucky Recognizes the Nicholl's Government.

Louisville, Feb. 2.—Information comes from Frankfort, that Gov McCreary of this State has recognized Nicholls as Governor of Louisiana, by issuing a requisition upon him for the return to Kentucky of Maria A Schwab, arrested in New Orleans for alleged fraud committed in Louisville.

## LOUISIANA.

Contestants Disputing Power in Louisiana.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 2.—The Superior Criminal Court has issued an order on Packard's Secretary of State, to deliver the returns to the Grand Jury. The Secretary of State replied that the records of his office don't show the Judge elected. The Secretary will consider the attempt to enforce the writ violation of the status quo, and refer the matter to Packard. Packard has pleaded in a suit against him, in the Nicholls Court.

### Mid-Night Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Nominations—Wells, Anderson, &c. WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—The Secretary of the Treasury was absent from the Cabinet meeting to-day.

Senator Thurman is suffering from neuralgia. Nominations: Channing Richards, Attorney for the Southern District of Ohio; S C Slade, Collector of Customs at El Paso Del Norte, Texas.

Among the Oregon telegrams is the following: WASHINGTON, Dec 8. Judge Strong, Salem, Oregon: Tilden has 185 votes, including one from Oregon. A. S. HEWITT.

Before the Committee on Privileges and Elections, Gen Anderson testified that he knew nothing of Hayes, in Vernon Parish, or the destruction of the returns. Anderson had known Maddox, to shake hands with him for 25 years. He never had two minutes talk with him. Did not hear in New Orleans of any proposition from Gov Wells to sell out the State. Gov Wells gave witness no information of the conversation with Maddox. Wells never spoke to witness of money for witness, or negro members of the board.

HOUSE.—No action to day on the bill to break continuous session.

The House was engaged all day in Committee of the Whole on the Legislative Appropriation bill of the proposed reduction of the salary of Senators and Representatives, from five thousand dollars, to four thousand five hundred dollars, was rejected and much ridiculed. The Committee only got through twelve of seventy-five pages of the bill.

SENATE.—A bill passed barring claims against the United States which the bureau officers are authorized to examine.

The Pacific Railroad sinking fund bill was postponed. Recess to ten to-morrow.

Flag floats over both Houses, indicating a continued session. In the Cabinet to-day, the contemplated message of the President on resumption was the main feature. The message is prepared.

The Electoral Commission met to-day, and the Court announced that two objections on each side would be allowed to speak on each side on each case. There is no provision for replies. Mr Tucker, of Virginia followed Mr Field on the Democratic side, and Kasson and McCrary followed. This closes the objection. To-morrow evidence will be received and the case will proceed under the management of the lawyers. Kasson argued strongly against going back of the returning board. There is nothing in the proceedings to indicate how soon a decision will be reached.
