

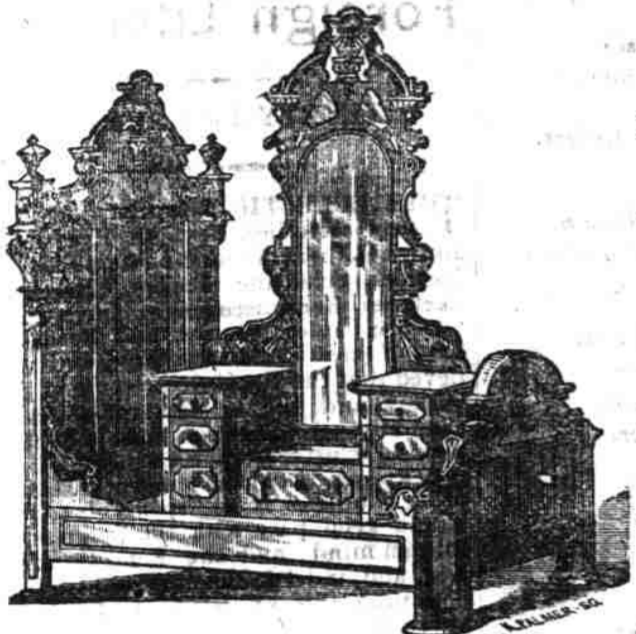

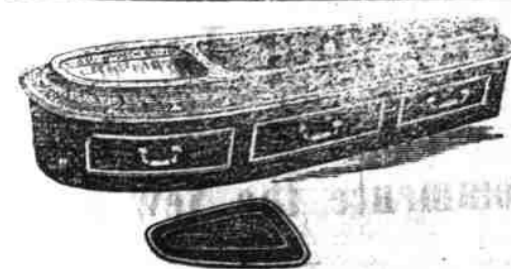

THE EFFECT OF THE COMMISSION'S PARTISAN VOTE.

Counsel Arguing the Humphrey's Case.

WELLS CHILLY.

Senate Considering the House's Eads' Appropriation Bill.

Policy of the Commission--The only Hope of the Democrats.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The stunning effect of the party decision of the Commission on the main question yesterday, is somewhat dissipated this morning. The Union claims that in all essential particulars, the question is before the Commission in the shape indicated and desired by Mr O'Coner in his opening statement.

Mr Green, counsel for the Democrats, called Geo P Rae, of Florida, who was sworn.

Question. Were you present when the writ of quo warrant was served? [Everts objected to the question as not being in order, and the Court sustained the objection to the question.]

Green then presented the certificate from the Clerk of the Court, that no resignation was filed up to January, 24th, 1877. Green then announced that that was all the affirmative evidence they were prepared to offer.

Humphreys, upon being sworn, produced Wood's letter accepting his resignation, and testified that another letter was received by him, dated Oct. 6th, 1876, from the Collector, requesting witness to turn over the books and papers of his office.

Clifford then announced the case ready for argument, two hours only allowed for each side.

The argument was commenced by Judge Hoodley.

The Committee on Privileges and Powers of the Senate, examined Albert Peyton, the Democratic Elector, who is a Pole, and he alleges was born in New York.

The Howe's Louisiana Committee examined Judge Davis, but nothing important transpired.

The Committee on Privileges and powers then took a recess on account of Fields being before the Commission.

Gov Wells had a chill this morning.

Judge Waite quoted "that yesterday's proceedings are merely preliminary, and furnished no indication of the final issue."

Dan Voorhees quoted, "A black eye but nothing serious."

HOUSE.—The treatment of the Returning Board, under discussion, came under a resolution by Hale, that the Sergeant-at-Arms had placed them in other quarters than those assigned by Speaker Randall.

SENATE.—The Senate, during the morning, discussed the House Bill for the payment of Jas B Eads for the construction of jetties at the south pass of the Mississippi River.

EVENING SESSION.

HOUSE.—Hale presented a communication from J Madison Wells and Thos C Anderson, stating that they were confined in a dark and damp cell where their health was being undermined on account of dampness and ill ventilation of the cell.

After debate, the resolution was referred to the Committee on the Louisiana election.

Carr asked leave to offer a resolution, directing that inasmuch as the Electoral Commission had refused to receive evidence taken by Southern Committees, the members of the Louisiana Returning Board be released from custody. Bland objected.

The Deficiency Appropriation Bill was reported from the Committee of the whole, but not acted upon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—A treaty for the Nicaragua ship canal was nearly ready for transmission to the Senate when Henry Meigs sprung a contract

with the Nicaragua government to build the canal over the route indicated by the treaty.

Rear Admiral Charles Wilkes is dead. Aged 76.

The Appropriation Committee is making its items for the military appropriation bill on the basis of twenty-two thousand men.

The case of the United States against Gen Belknap was dismissed on motion of the District Attorney, by direction of the Attorney General, for the reason that the evidence would not sustain the prosecution. The action was taken by direction of the President.

Mrs Mary S Oliver, a citizen of Pennsylvania and a clerk in the Treasury, has instituted suit against Hon Simon Cameron for breach of promise of marriage. Damages \$50,000. Respective age of parties, 35 and 78.

The argument in the Florida case is closed. Each side used their powers in argument which was very close and technical. The Commission will take the case into private consideration early to-morrow morning, and it is expected they will reach a result during the day. The Democrats have little hope for anything more favorable to them than the throwing out of the vote.

The contest in the Louisiana case will be over the legality of the returning board itself. It will be claimed that there has been no canvass of the votes and that no electors have been appointed. The same excellent authority which furnishes these rather discouraging forebodings, expresses absolute confidence that the Commission has inaugurated a line of procedure that must throw out the vote of Watts, the Oregon postmaster.

SENATE.—The Eads bill was indefinitely postponed—Yeas 80, nays 24. The Indian Appropriation bill with amendments which carries it back to the House, passed. Adjourned.

ACROSS THE WATER.

Foss Explosion—Ten Killed—Lord Sausbury's Resignation Rumored—The effect of Midhat Pasha's Resignation on Turkey's Policy—Important Bankrupt Decision.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—The British steamer Eddi, from Bilbao for Newport, Wales, was wrecked on the 19th of last month.

An explosion in the foss of the colliery near Bolton, killed ten persons.

Parliament meets to-day. Grave differences is reported between Lord Sausbury and his colleagues. Rumors of the resignation of Lord Sausbury are in circulation.

The causes and effects of the down fall of Midhat Pasha are still the subjects of conflicting views. Constantinople advices reiterates the statement that the dismissal of Midhat Pasha does not imply a change in Turkey's foreign and international policy.

The registrar in bankruptcy has decided in favor of the United States on an appeal from the decision of the Trustee in Liquidation of the liabilities of Clews, Habicht & Co. This decision will enable the United States to prove the debt which the trustees objected to on the ground that it was due from a New York house, because the London house had not yet received remittance at time of Henry Clews & Co's failure. The answer was that Henry Clews & Co received the remittances merely as agents of Clews, Habicht & Co. The decision of the trustee was over ruled with costs.

Ex-Gov Grover Turns Over the Executive Office to Sec'y Chadwick.

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—A dispatch says: Last evening Ex-Gov Grover arrived at Salem by overland from the East. Mr Grover after formally turning over the executive office to Secretary Chadwick, now acting Governor, will return immediately to Washington to assume his seat in the Senate on March 4th.

Insurance Officers Held for False Statements.

ST LOUIS, February 8.—Jno T Douglas, President of the Columbia Life Insurance, and Edwin W Bryant, Actuaries are held for making and swearing to false statements as to the Columbia Life Insurance Company.

A \$40,000 Fire in New York.

NEW YORK, Feb 8.—Martin E Murphy's planing mill on Timpkins street, was nearly destroyed. Durmo's lumber yard, and Gunn's flour store were damaged by fire this morning. Loss \$40,000.

A Steamer Collides and Sinks.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 8.—The steamer Boston struck a tow boat early this morning at Sciotoville and sunk to her upper deck. No lives were lost. She was the largest upper river steamer running.

Jao O. Mahoney's Remains to be Taken to Ireland.

NEW YORK, Feb 8.—The remains of John O. Mahoney, the late Fenian Head Centre, will be taken to Ireland for interment.

Death of a Celebrated Cow.

LONDON, Feb 8.—The short horn cow Tenth Duces, of Geneva, is dead. She was bought by Lord Bective at New York Mills in '73, for over thirty thousand dollars.

Deficiency in a National Bank.

HARTFORD, Conn., Feb. 8.—The deficiency in the Farmers Mechanic's National Bank is estimated at half a million. Its liabilities are not endangered.

The Wrecked Steamer.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—There are reasons to believe that the wrecked steamer is the George Cromwell instead of the George Washington. Both belong to the same line, and were on the same voyage.
