

SOUTH CAROLINA NEWS.

Wm Black, Esq, a prominent citizen of Lancaster county, and formally a representative of the county in the Legislature, died on Sunday last.

Joseph Young, Jr., Jury Commissioner of Spartanburg, is still absent, and no jury drawn for March term of court, consequently there will be no court.

Six new buildings are in course of construction in Aiken. The workmen employed on these are nearly all colored men, and yet the fact corresponds with the New York Commercial Advertiser's complaint that the "poor negro cannot find work enough to furnish them with bread.

The Anderson court began on Monday. The case against the Greenville and Columbia Railroad Company for criminal carelessness in the Broadway tunnel will very likely come up for trial on a suit for damages. The eminent counsel have been employed by both sides, and the case will be one of unusual importance.

At Five o'clock in Columbia on Thursday night J. H. Rankin, Esq., the ex-convict of the Columbia circuit, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head with a revolver.

Mr Rankin was a young man, about 30 years of age, a native of Ohio, and a brother-in-law of ex-Congressman Hope, of the Third Congressional District.
