



New Orleans, Feb 15 .- Two men called at the door of the State House to-day and asked for Packard. One claimed to be an ex federal officer and the other a discharged soldier. They were brought to the head of the stairs, when one claiming to be a correspondent, named Weldon, of the Philadelphia Press, and desired to see Gov.
