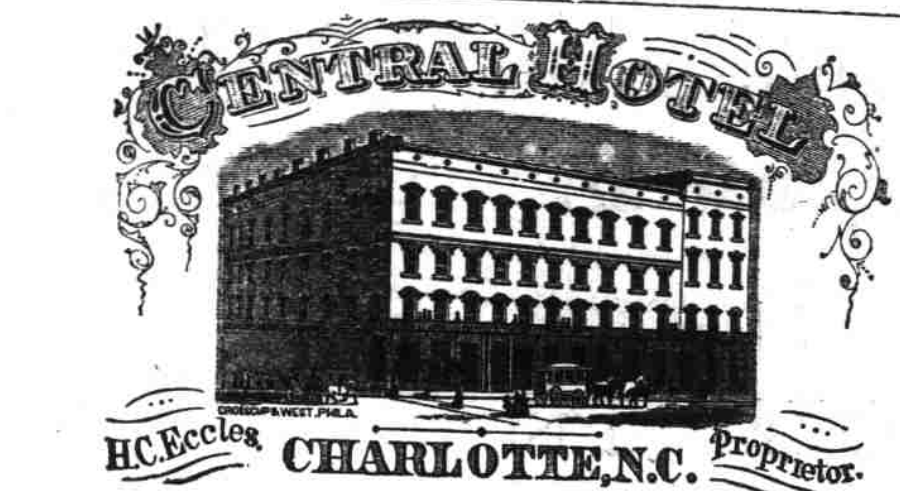

DEMOCRATS CHEERFUL. The "Going Behind the Returns"--Part of the Electoral Bill Undergoing Inspection by the Democrats.

EVARTS ARGUING FOR STATE RIGHTS AND NON-INTERFERENCE.

Over Three Hours Consumed by Evarts in his Speech--Loss of Vitality by the Speaker.

TROOPS TO STOP BLOCKADING. Introduction of Various Bills--Babcock under Examination.

When the Commission will Report on the Louisiana case.

WASHINGTON, February 15. The World's Washington dispatch says that several Democratic members of the electoral commission, who were members of the committee which framed the law under which the commission is acting, have had conferences of an informal nature, in order to compare votes and refresh their recollections as to the interpretation which was put upon the bill while on the committee, regarding the matter of going behind the returns in the disputed states.

THE COMMISSION. Evarts contended that the right to cast its vote rests with the state for whatever power the Federal Government had, it held through the terms of the Federal Constitution. The whole matter belonged to the state, and it was for the Federal Government to count the votes after they had left the state, as in the Florida case.

SENATE.--Mr Hamlin, of Maine, submitted a resolution, allowing the electoral commission to occupy the chamber for its session in the evening, after the Senate shall have taken recess for the day; agreed to.

THE COMMISSION. Judge Carpenter closed at 5 o'clock, after a short secret session, in which the commission agreed to vote to-morrow at 4 o'clock. There will be an open session to-morrow after 4 o'clock.

RUSSIA AND TURKEY. 200,000 Men Ready to March at a Moment's Notice.

LONDON, Feb 15.--The correspondent of the Daily News at Kischeneff gives a full account of the Russian mobilized army. In a telegram dated Feb 14, which has been delayed in transmission, he states that the army at Kischeneff, which would first move against the Turks, numbers 120,000 infantry, 3,000 cavalry, and 428 guns.

Packard the Usurper Wounded in the State House by an Unknown Man--A Bloody Affray.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb 15.--Two men called at the door of the State House to-day and asked for Packard. One claimed to be an ex federal officer and the other a discharged soldier. They were brought to the head of the stairs, when one claiming to be a correspondent, named Weldon, of the Philadelphia Press, and desired to see Gov. Packard, was sent in and found Packard seated at his desk, talking to Judge Boreman. Weldon took a vacant chair on Packard's left and asked: "When can I see you?" Packard turned and found a pistol pointed at his head. He struck the pistol down which discharged taking effect in Packard's right knee. Packard knocked Weldon down, when several drew pistols and fired, wounding Weldon severely but not fatally.

Meeting of Bondholders. NEW YORK, Feb 15.--Consolidated mortgage bondholders of the New Orleans, Jackson & Great Northern Railroad Company, and of the Mississippi Central Railroad Company was held to-day. There were present parties representing over five million worth of bonds.

A Murderer Dies on the Eve of Execution. NEW MARKET, N. J., Feb. 15.--Ryar, the condemned murderer who was to have been hanged to-day with Ochs-wald, his partner in the killing of policeman Brock, died in his cell at 8 o'clock this morning. He was very sick all night, and it is supposed he had taken poison.

Hat Firm Failed. NEW YORK, Feb 15.--Boyd, Malloy & Co., hat jobbers, have failed, liabilities \$84,000; real assets \$40,000. Forgers Captured. DUBUQUE, Feb 15.--Six men fully equipped for making counterfeit coins, have been captured.

Southern States--Their Public Debts.

New York, Feb. 15.--The committee of bankers, appointed to make arrangements for the settlement of public debts of the southern states, held a meeting last night. Virginia was the only state discussed at length, but the feeling expressed from the first, was one of sympathy and a determination to be as liberal as possible with all the states under consideration. No definite conclusion was reached.
