"Packard Shall Never be Governor."

HONORE'S BOX ARRIVED TOO LATE.

KENNER DENIES ATTEMPTING TO BRIBE WELLS.

Congress Adjourned Until Ten, A. M., Monday.

Senate and House Will Continue Counting Electoral Votes on Monday.

Bogy Scores Bradley as he Deserves.

WASHINGTON, February 17.

In an editorial, based upon dispatches from Deputy Stockton to Marshal Pitkin, the National Republican, a "newspaper" says: "By our dispatches it will be seen that the White League of Louisiana, are threatening to cut the telegraphic communications of New Orleans with the North, and fight for the State House to-day. They asserted yesterday that Packard should die if he attempted to rule the State. Interesting news may be expected from that quarter to-day."

Before the Committee on Privileges and Elections Casper Jordan declined to answer questions until he could consult with his lawyer. He had consulted only the President and Directors of the bank, but refused to state their advice. The questions referred to the bank accounts of Tilden, Hewitt and Pelton. The Committee has gone into private session.

Honore's box of papers are said to cover all the Louisiana election returns. It is four feet long, two wide and two deep. The papers are useless now, unless they could be brought to bear on the State Government of Louisiana.

Before the committee on Privileges and Powers, D F Kenner testified that Gov. Wells told an untruth when he said that he (Kenner) offered to bribe him (Wells) to cast the vote of Louisiana for Tilden. During a long conversation with Wells, he said he must be rewarded, but he (Kenner) did not mention any sum. At a subsequent interview, Wells had said that Anderson wanted a half million. Kenner said this was ridiculous. Wells said wait a few days longer. Subsequently Wells said he could not give a fair count, but would retain enough votes to save Nichols, for two hundred dollars in hand. Witness replied he had not that sum. This closed the negotiations.

The Democratic members of the House postponed the caucus bill to-night. Prominent Democrats say there will be no factious opposition when the two houses meet in joint session on Monday.

This house resolution was adopted, to receive the senate at 11 o'clock Monday.

Recess to 10 o'clock Monday.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

HOUSE.—Lamar offered a resolution directing the clerk of the house to inform the senate that it would, at 11 o'clock, Monday, be ready to receive that body for the purpose of continuing with the counting of the votes. Adopted by a vote of 152 yeas, 111 nays.

On motion of Lamar, the house by a vote of yeas, 149, nays, 107, took a recess until Monday at 10 o'clock.

The democratic caucus was announced for 7:30 this evening.

SENATE.—A communication was received from Justice Clifford, endorsing the decision of the commission on the Louisiana case.

Mr Kelly, of Oregon, made a statement, similar to the telegraphed last night, only more full and entirely clearing himself of taint. He read the following: Salem, Feb. 16th, 1877, to Hon James K Kelly, Washington: Deny that I sent any telegram to Tilden. I never sent a cipher in my life. L F Grover.

A general discussion followed, in which mutual fraud was charged.

Mr Bogy referred to the proceedings before the electoral commission, and said the commission in the case of Florida, laid down two rules for its guidance. First, that they would not investigate anything which had transpired before or preceding the return made by the Governor, excepting in relation to the eligibility of the electors. Their decision left that question open for investigation by a vote of 7 to 8. It was, of course, believed by the whole country, that the same rule would be applied to Louisiana. Who, on earth, would have doubted the propriety of the application of that rule, when it had been enforced in the case of the State of Florida? Yet, we know that but yesterday that decision was reversed. We know that a member of the commission but yesterday changed his position upon that subject, and while it was competent in the State of Florida to go behind the returns, to examine whether the electors were or were not eligible under the constitution of the U. S., when the motion was made by the Senator from Delaware, Mr Bayard, to apply the same rule to Louisiana, the decision was reversed. The case had been made so plain by counsel, so strong, so irrefutable, that such an examination could not take place without proving beyond the possibility of doubt, that more than one elector from that State was not entitled to the position of elector, because he was not eligible, and this decision was changed by this commission. Sir, the name of Jeffreys and Marlborough have come down to us for ages past, covered with disgrace and shame, because they were corrupt judges, and the name of that man who changed his vote upon that commission, Justice Bradley, will go down to after ages disgraced. His name will be associated with Marlborough and Jeffreys, and it never will be pronounced without a hiss from all good men in this country.

THE ENGLISH PARLIAMENT.

Gladstone Evasive for the First Time in his Life—Resignation of the Duke of Edinburgh—Negotiations About to Commence Between Montenegro and Turkey.

LONDON, Feb 17.—During the debate in the House of Commons on the Eastern question, Mr Chaplin, conservative, declared that Mr Gladstone as an honorable man should withdraw his charges against the government, or test their truth by a definite motive.

Mr Gladstone complains bitterly for having for the first time in his life been accused of disinclination to meet his opponents fairly, but he declined to reveal his plan. Sir Stafford Northcote, Chancellor of the Exchequer, urged that the opposition were bound to either challenge the government's conduct, or admit that their charges had been made in ignorance. The Marquis of Hartington, without absolutely promising to introduce such a motion, would not admit that the liberal accusations were made under a false impression. If they refrained from challenging the government policy, it was because that policy had undergone a change.

The Courier asserts that the Duke of Edinburgh, for domestic reasons, has resigned the command of Her Majesty's steamship, Sultan, and is returning to England.

A dispatch from Constantinople states that in consequence of a fresh dispatch from the Grand Vizier, urging the expediency of conducting his negotiations between the Porte and Montenegro, Prince Nicholas has assented to the proposal by announcing that he will immediately send delegates to Constantinople.
