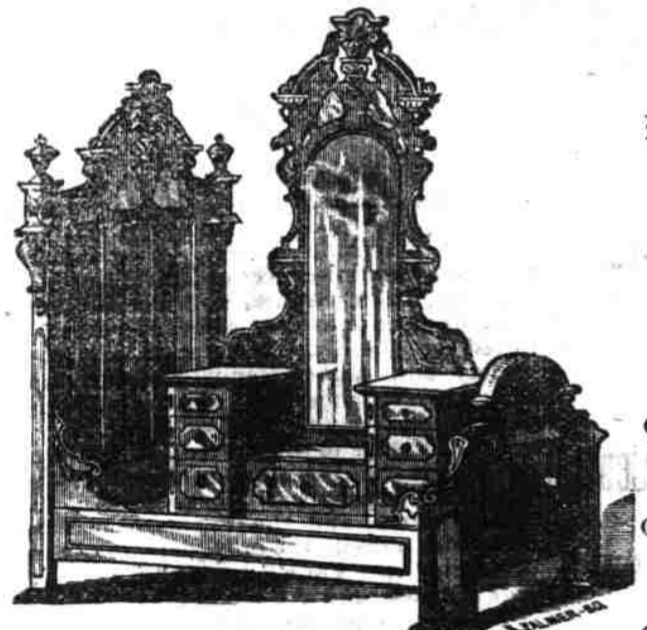

House Committee Report in Favor of Nicholls' Government in Louisiana.

CAUCUS OF DEMOCRATS.

THE COUNT TO BE DELAYED.

Proposition for a New Election.

MUCH DIVISION.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—A disagreeable feeling pervades politics this morning. There is doubt as to the action of Justices Strong and Bradley. The irreconcilables of the Democratic party find they cannot secure the six Democratic Senators necessary to read objections sufficiently long to defeat a result before the 4th of March, and Mr. Randall's rulings make ordinary parliamentary tactics of calling the ayes and nays ineffectual. There is apprehension that should the Commission decide to count Oregon, two for Hayes and one for Tilden, the six Senators and some to spare can be found among the Republicans to sign necessary protests to consume the time.

Senator John Sherman is with Hayes at Columbus. The resignation of Sherman, to be followed by Hayes' election to the Senate and his subsequent elevation to the Presidency, are discussed here, if not at Columbus by Hayes and Sherman.

It is determined beyond a doubt to hamper the army appropriation bill with provisions that can only be removed by the recognition of Hampton and Nicholls. The day is big with events, but affairs have so shaped themselves that the best interests of the South cannot be seriously affected.

Before the privileges and powers committee P. J. Kennedy under cross examination testified that he acted a week with the Packard legislature and then went over to Nicholls' legislature; did not solicit from Packard, Kellogg or any one else support of United States Senate; offered money to no one; may have said to some of Packard's legislature that they would get mileage from Nicholls, because Nicholls had money, and Packard had none.

Judge Ray of Louisiana on the stand. The Senate passed a bill to remove the political disabilities of Henry B. Kelley of Louisiana, C. A. R. Jones of Alabama; L. B. Moore, W. F. Carrington and Samuel D. Turner, of Virginia; R. C. Gatlin of Arkansas; Wm. Butler and A. H. Gibbs of South Carolina; Wm. R. Jones and R. S. Kenney of Texas.

Informal meeting at Speaker Randall's house agreed that the army should consist of 17,000 men, with a proviso that troops should not be used in support of either party of the dual governments of Louisiana or South Carolina.

THE COMMISSION.

Reported very unreliably that Cronin's vote is rejected and that the rejection of Watt's vote is now under consideration.

3 p. m.—Nothing to hang a doubt or hope on.

Recess of half an hour taken to send for Thurman to vote on the question of casting three Oregon votes for Hayes. A Democratic Senator of the commission is quoted: That the question is virtually decided, as eight members including Bradley have expressed themselves in favor of this motion.

Midnight.

The Commission adopted a resolution that the ballots cast for Odell, Cartwright and Watts were the lawful electoral votes of the State of Oregon and should be counted for Hayes and Wheeler. The vote stood 8 yeas and nays.

The House occupied all day in the committee of whole in consideration of sundry civil appropriation bills. When the paragraph was reached relative to the mail contractors in certain of the Southern States a point of order was raised that it change existing laws. Pending the decision on the point the Commission rose and the

House took a recess till to-morrow at 10 o'clock. A Democratic caucus was announced to take place immediately.

Nominations—Jas. Williamson, of Iowa, Commissioner of the District of Columbia, vice Kitcham, resigned.

The Alabama witnesses were discharged. Those from Mississippi will be discharged to-morrow.

In the Senate, the disabilities of L. S. Baker, D. H. Hill, John S. Marmaduke, Henry B. Kelley, C. A. R. Jones, S. B. Moore, W. F. Carrington, S. D. Turner, W. A. Webb, R. C. Gatlin, Wm. Butler, Wade H. Gibbs, William R. Jones, R. S. Kenney, were removed.

The Cashier Jourdan was discharged. The naval appropriation bill passed. The Louisiana Committee of the House resolved to report the bill recognizing Nicholls as Governor of that State. Recess.

Directly after the recess a note was read from the desk inviting the Democrats to remain for the purpose of holding a caucus. When the hall had been cleared of all other Representatives, Representative Lamar called the meeting to order. He said that he had been requested to suggest that the caucus adjourn till half past 7 to night; whereupon a member proposed Saturday night, but the voice of the majority was in favor of continuing the caucus this evening without an adjournment.

Representative McMahon of Ohio, moved that to-morrow a motion be made in the House, inviting the Senate to meet the House in joint session at 1 o'clock on Monday.

Representative Keher of Missouri offered a substitute, namely, that a motion be made in the House inviting the Senate to meet the House in joint session to-morrow at 1 o'clock for the purpose of proceeding with the count of the electoral vote. To this Representative Neal of Ohio, offered an amendment which Keher accepted, to the effect that after the two Houses shall have met in joint session to receive the decision of the electoral commission on the Oregon question and shall have separated thereon, the House will then proceed to discuss the decision. An earnest and excited discussion ensued in which Representatives Vance of Ohio, Knott of Kentucky, Sparks of Illinois, and Lane of Oregon participated favoring delay till Monday.

Representatives Hill of Ga., Brown of Kentucky, Wilshire of Arkansas, Harrison of Illinois, and House of Tennessee, were in favor of inviting the Senate to meet with the House to-morrow for the purpose of continuing the count of the electoral vote.

Speaker Randall made a few remarks counselling calm deliberation in view of the importance of the question presented.

Representative Field of New York, also spoke, briefly stating that he had prepared two bills, one providing for the election of President and Vice President, on the first Tuesday in May. The presiding officer of the Senate to act as President in the interval between the fourth of March and that time. The other bill provided for quo warranto proceedings, so that certificates for the Presidency and Vice Presidency can go before the Supreme Court and there present their claims to the office. Under the operations of the previous questions a substitute and amendment to McMahon's motion were rejected: yeas 44, nays 66. The resolution of McMahon inviting the Senate to meet the House at 1 o'clock Monday was then adopted by about 20 majority. The reasons given by several gentlemen who were present at the caucus for the delay were that the House wanted time for reflection, and to prepare objections to South Carolina and other cases.

A number of Democrats who didn't sustain the delay left the Hall from time to time before the close of the proceedings, and others privately said after the adjournment, that they would not be bound by the caucus, as many Democrats had purposely absented themselves. Representative Willis of New York, will under all circumstances oppose the postponements contemplated by McMahon's resolution. No action was taken on Field's two bills, which Willis regarded as unconstitutional, and besides a quo warranto before the Supreme Court, some of whose number have decided against Tilden, would be ineffectual. The Democrats of the caucus who favored the immediate resumption of the counting of the electoral vote, express their surprise that those who advocate to muster such strong force and say that many Democrats who will act differently, were not aware that there would be a caucus to-night as besides the sixty-six who voted for delay scarcely number more than of the Democrats of the House.

The Great Prima Dona Elopse—Judicial Action for Divorce.

PARIS, Feb. 23.—The Figaro names a distinguished Prima Dona whom it charges with having eloped from St. Petersburg with Senor Nicolmi. It states further that Marquis Coux followed them and that judicial proceedings for separation have been commenced.

It is stated that Adelina Patti applied for judicial separation from Marquis Coux.

A Cardinal Declines to let Mahoney's Remains lie in the Cathedral.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Cardinal Cullen in a letter to the O'Mahoney funeral committee says: "I am unaware that O'Mahoney contributed any signal service for his country but I believe that he rather provoked hostile legislation against us. I have been unable to learn that he was a great benefactor of the church. On the contrary he is said to have written in a spirit hostile to it. He was the head centre of the Fenians and collected large sums to promote their absurd movements soon after the Fenianism had been condemned the church. If I were to allow his remains to lie in the Cathedral, I should seem to approve his religious and public conduct, and his projects relative to Ireland, a responsibility which I am not at all inclined to assume."

Failure of Commission Merchants.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Norris & Brooks cotton commission merchants failed. Liabilities upward of \$100,000. They dealt principally in spot cotton. A member of the firm said that the failure would probably be only temporary, and arrangements were in progress for satisfactory settlement with creditors.

Funeral of the Oldest Catholic Priest in the World.

LANCASTER, Pa., Feb. 23.—A dispatch reports the funeral of Rev. Brevard Keenan, aged 98 years. He was the oldest Catholic priest in the world and for 54 years pastor of St. Mary's church of that city.
