SOUTH CAROLINA SOON TO BE REACHED.

The Commission's Oregon Decision Before the Senate.

OREGON COUNTED FOR HAYES BY A STRICT PARTY VOTE.

Vote of Pennsylvania Objected To.

Hayes Disavows Having Inspired the Editorial About Packard's Government.

HOUSE CAUCUSSING.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.

It seems to have been forgotten that there are two returns from Vermont. The highest Democratic candidate of that State cast his vote in the place of a postmaster.

The feeling among the Democrats is becoming more bitter. House—McMahon offered a resolution to meet the Senate at 10 o'clock.

Wilson offered a substitute, to meet the Senate immediately, which was adopted by a vote of 145 to 85.

Vance moved to have a recess immediately, but was ruled out under a motion to reconsider. Wilson's motion, and lay on the table.

The ayes and nays were taken on this, the object being to filibuster until after 12 o'clock, when Friday's legislative day ends, when a motion for recess may be entertained.

Julian, of Indiana is here to argue the South Carolina case in behalf of the Democrats.

At 11 1/2 o'clock, the dilatory motions having failed, the Senate entered the House.

They will make a report on Oregon, when a recess will be taken until Monday.

The result of this morning's proceedings is regarded as favorable to Hayes' inauguration.

It has been found that Honore has not fully complied with the subpoena "duces tecum," so additional papers have been ordered, and the committee will wait their arrival.

No committees are in session. Ferry is reported as denying having duplicate returns from Vermont. They will, however, be called for when Vermont is reached. It is suspected that Ferry fibbed the extra returns.

House.—A motion of Mr. Clymer, one of the irreconcilables, that the House take recess to 10 Monday, was defeated—ayes 102, nays 132. This was by a standing vote, and the ayes and nays are progressing. The result will be nearly the same, and the two hours debate on Oregon will occur. The second joint session and progress of the count of South Carolina is possible to-day.

The vote resulted 115 for to 156 against a recess, and the debate and count progresses.

Lane, of Oregon, moves to take a recess to half past 9 Monday. Randall ruled that the motion was out of order, and debate was opened by Mr Lawrence, of Ohio, in favor of sustaining the decision of the Commission.

Upon the return of the Senate to its chamber at 12:10, Mr. Sargent, of California, submitted a resolution that the decision of the Commission upon the electoral vote of the State of Oregon stand as the judgment of the Senate, objection made thereto, to the contrary notwithstanding. The debate was opened by Mr. Kelly, of Oregon, who denied that Watts was eligible as a Presidential elector.

Midnight. W H Kernon, of Columbus, Miss, was nominated for postmaster.

House.—At the end of the two hours, the two Houses re-assembled in joint session and the vote of Oregon was counted for Hayes and Wheeler.

Pennsylvania was next opened, and Springer and Tucker presented objections which were signed by a sufficient number of members and Senators who allege a vacancy illegally filled by the college.

The two Houses separated, and a motion for recess to 10 o'clock, Monday was carried by a vote of 132 to 121. SENATE.—Mr Conkling, who was ab-

sent heretofore when the question of sustaining the decisions of the commission came up, said, in the Oregon case, the State of Oregon intended to appoint a Republican elector, and the people of Oregon intended to elect a Republican elector, and voted for Mr Watts. The commission had given its decision, and he disclaimed any intention of alluding to any of the reasons which prompted the decision of the commission, and believing that the State of Oregon intended to appoint a Republican elector, he should vote to sustain and affirm that intention and the decision of the commission. He was also opposed to impeding, in the slightest degree, the operation of the decisions of the commission, and on the contrary, was in favor of aiding it and consummating it at the earliest practicable moment. The decision was sustained by a party vote.

J B Williams, Jr, of Mobile, Ala, testified before the Senate committee on privileges and elections in regard to the Chapel Hill Church fight in Mississippi. He said the negroes did the first firing; that Bogan was four miles from the fight. He is the man that Outlaw said killed the negro, Charley Curry. That Henry Outlaw was one of the ringleaders of all the disturbances that had occurred during the canvass in Ocktibbea county.

Disavows that Hayes in any way inspired the articles in the Ohio State Journal, regarding the recognition of the Packard government in Louisiana, continues to come in. The associate proprietor of that paper, and the Speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives, both telegraphed that Gov Hayes was not responsible for it. Gen Cornily, the editor, is seriously ill. Speaker Grabener's dispatch says the article in question was originally a communication, laying in the office, and was used by the young men in charge of the office, in the absence of Gen Cornily, occasioned by severe illness.

After two hour's debate the Senate agreed to count the vote of Pennsylvania without division.

The House committee on appropriations agreed to non concur in subsidies for New Orleans, Brazil, California and China mails.

Secretary Morrill is getting better. The President spent an hour with him to-day.

The House is caucussing to night.

The Russian Army in Warlike Array.

LONDON, Feb 24.—A special dispatch from Berlin to the Pall Mall Gazette says it is stated in well informed circles that the Czar will certainly await the powers reply to Prince Gortschakoff's circular before attacking Turkey.

A Russian officer, just arrived from Kirchenoff, gives a highly favorable account of the Russian army, but it is positively asserted that Russia in no case will commence hostilities before March 31.

O'Mahoney's Body Lying in State at Cork—Elections in Germany.

CORK, Ireland, Feb 24.—O'Mahoney's remains were brought from Queenstown in a special steamer and now lies in state at Mechanics' Institute. The demonstration is small.

BERLIN, Germany, Feb. 24.—Herr Von Forckenbeck has been elected President of Reichstag, and Prince Hakenloep Langenburg and Herr Haniffenberg, Vice Presidents.

Servian and Turkish Affairs.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb 24.—It is believed that a complete understanding will be reached to day between the Porte and Servia, envoys of the latter having accepted Turkish conditions, except those claiming equality for Jews in Servia and the rights of the Porte to be diplomatically represented at Belgrade. Servia will be vacated by the Turkish troops ten days after the conditions of peace are ratified.

A Schooner Run into and Sunk.

NEW YORK, Feb 24.—The schooner M. E. Donner, from Weymouth, Mass., for Savannah, Ga., was run down and sunk by the brig Mariposa, on the 19th of February, in latitude 36, 40, longitude 74, 12. The crew of the Donner were brought to this port by brig Mary E. Pennell.

FLASHES.

NEW YORK, Feb 24.—Gen. Aguilero, President of the Cuban Republic, died in New York yesterday.

BILBOA, February 24.—Tempestuous weather for the past two days. One English and two French ships are reported lost, with all on board.

BALTIMORE, Feb 24.—Gen. Andrew W. Dennison, postmaster, found dead.
