Hayes' Letter on His Probable Southern Policy.

SHERIDAN OPPOSED TO PACKARD.

WHY THE COUNT PROGRESSES SO SMOOTHLY.

NEW SENATORS PRESENT—COMMISSION ADJOURNS TILL FRIDAY.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.

The letter telegraphed yesterday, cannot be located, but it exists, and partially accounts for the progress which has been allowed to be made in the count.

In the commission four hours is allowed to each side, but it is thought that hardly that time will be used.

The Senate re-assembled at 10, a. m., and, in accordance with the notice given yesterday, Mr McDonald called up the House resolutions in respect to the memory of the late Speaker Kerr.

HOUSE.—Most of the session was spent in the consideration of the sundry civil appropriation bill, which, however, was not completed.

A bill to provide for vacancies in the office of President and Vice President, that may arise through the failure of the two Houses to count the electoral vote, was reported by Field, of New York.

A motion to suspend the rules and adopt resolutions, recognizing the Democratic governments of Louisiana and South Carolina, was made by Schleicher, of Texas, and failed for a want of a two-thirds majority.

SENATE.—The citizens of Washington petition for the use of the retunda of the Capital for the inauguration ball, was referred to the committee on buildings.

The committee on Foreign relations reported favorably on the bill to pay Wm L Seruggs, Minister to Bogota, certain moneys.

The joint committee on Chinese, reported, and the report was ordered to be printed.

The bill, creating the sinking fund for the Pacific Railroad, was postponed to December next; ayes, 29. nays, 28.

The bill for public buildings in Austin, Texas, passed.

The House bill, which passed to-day regarding vacancy in the office of President, was read by Little and referred to the committee on privileges and elections.

The credentials of John T Morgan, elected from Alabama, were presented. Executive session. Recess.

The impression still prevails among the employees of the House that a count will be finally prevented, but in more thoughtful circles the hope or fear of it is abandoned.

The Southern people to manage their own affairs. Stanley Matthews is day spoke quite freely in the same direction and Senator Sherman has taken pains to let it be known that he is not trying to shape the Southern policy of Mr Hayes.

The Cabinet had a very long session and some efforts was made to change the Southern policy which way is not known, but the President was immovable.

All the secretaries have placed their resignations in the Presidents hands.

The Commission.

The secret session on the South Carolina case commenced at 2 o'clock. They adjourned at 7 o'clock after having voted 8 to 7 to count the State for Hayes and Wheeler.

Gen John T Morgan, of Alabama ex Gov A H Garland of Arkansas, ex-Gov Isham G Harris, of Tennessee, and ex-Gov Richard F Coke, of Texas, United States Senators from their respective States, have arrived in the city in anticipation of an extra session of the Senate for executive business.

By Blount and Atkins' efforts to-day in getting \$150,000 to pay Southern ante bellum mail contractors appropriated by sundry civil bill, Georgia will be benefitted about \$80,000.

The Commission adjourned to Friday unless called together by the presiding officer. It has been ascertained there are no further double returns.

ON THE OTHER SIDE.

When the New Policy of the Vatican will be Proclaimed—The Position of German Bishops in Relation to the Execution of Laws.

LONDON, Feb 27.—A Times' dispatch from Rome says it is stated that the Cardinals submitted to the Pope on Friday favorable replies to some questions which he proposed to them with the object of giving the ecclesiastical policy of the Holy See a more efficacious and energetic direction toward a natural solution of the various questions of the day.

PESTH, Feb 27.—The reappointment of the Tisza ministry which resigned on account of the differences between Austria and Hungary on the bond question, is gazetted.

BUCHAREST, Feb 27.—In the Senate to-day, the President of the council in reply to an interpellation refused to produce the documents relative to Roumania's neutrality in the event of war between Turkey and Russia.

PARIS, Feb 27.—A letter from Adeline Patti has been published, declaring the statements in the Figaro about her eloping with the Tenor Nicolini, are wholly inaccurate.

LONDON, Feb 27.—The Times' second edition publishes a dispatch from its St Petersburg correspondent saying: An extraordinary council of ministers was held here yesterday, at which the Czar presided. Gen Ignatieff was present. I learn on the best authority that it was decided to demobilize the Russian army when peace is signed between the Porte, Servia and Montenegro.

The Supreme Court Unable to Agree.

COLUMBIA, Feb 27.—The Supreme Court was thronged again at 1 o'clock awaiting the decision. The Justices met in the consulting room and remained there one hour, when they appeared in the bench and announced that they had been unable to agree on the decision, but might probably in a few days. The docket was then called and the crowd dispersed.
