The Stock Law Assessment.

Superior Court.

The second week of Mecklenburg Superior Court was opened yesterday morning His Honor J. M. Cloud presiding. The following are the cases disposed of during the day:

State vs. Laura Davidson for assault and battery guilty; ordered to be imprisoned in the county jail for one month and thereafter till the cost is paid.

State vs. Charles Williams for larceny; guilty; judgment withheld.

State vs. Floyd Neal and Marshal Metz for larceny; not guilty.

State vs. Bob Neil for assault with intent to commit rape; guilty; no judgment.

State vs. Will Stewart—pleaded guilty; no sentence.

State vs. Sewell Gillespie and David McElwain for assault and battery; guilty; no sentence.

Of Interest to Lawyers.

A bill has passed the House reducing the price of the Supreme Court Reports from \$8 to \$3 per copy. This reduction in the price of the Reports, says the Raleigh News, destroys the commission hitherto made by Attorney Generals on the sale of the books, and to some what compensate for this the Attorney General is allowed in this bill \$750 as Reporter of the Supreme Court.

Horse and Buggy Seized.

A few days ago William Taylor, a native of this county, and until recently a resident of Arkansas hired a horse and buggy from the livery stable of Hunter & Farrow and left. A day or two afterwards the owners of the horse and buggy heard that he had traded off the buggy in Berryhill township, and having borrowed a saddle and bridle from some one in the neighborhood, again disappeared.

Personal.

Hon. J. Ross Snowden, ex-Director of the United States Mint visited the Charlotte mint yesterday. He will remain in the city some time, and will examine the mints in this section with the view of making a report of their character, and advise as to the feasibility of re-establishing a branch mint of coinage here.

The eloquent and grandiloquent Judge T. J. Mackey and ex-Gov. R. K. Scott of South Carolina, passed through the city yesterday morning en route for Washington City. The former goes as he says in the interest of Hampton. About three days hence look out for interviews from the "special messenger."

A Criminal Court.

We understand that a petition to the Legislature for the establishment of a Criminal Court in this county has been signed by almost every member of the Charlotte bar. The experience of the past week has shown that an inferior Court of some sort, for the trial of criminal cases is an absolute necessity, as the civil docket which is very heavy, will not be reached before Wednesday, and probably not then.

Meeting of County Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners held their regular monthly meeting at the Court House yesterday. Scarcely anything in which the public feel any interest was done, the meeting being mainly taken up with routine business.

A Compliment to Col Johnston from England—The Last of the Parsons Who was not "Rev."

A few days ago Col Wm Johnston, Mayor of the city, received a letter from Liverpool, England, thanking him for his letter setting forth the conduct of "our man" Parsons, who figured here as the champion of the negroes in the cause of Good Templarism.

The letter alluded to above expresses the warmest sympathy for the South, in the efforts which have been made to defraud and misrepresent her. The writer, who is a prominent member of the Order of Good Templars in England, states that this is the general feeling among the Good Templars of that country.

The letter is accompanied by the following resolution written on parchment paper and bearing the seal of the Independent Order of Good Templars and signed by all the "Grand Worthies," to wit:

I. O. G. T., SOUTH WEST LANCASHIRE DISTRICT LODGE, ENGLAND.

Resolved, That the best thanks of this Executive Committee of the Good Templars for the District of South West Lancashire be and are here tendered to William Johnston, Esquire, Mayor of Charlotte, North Carolina, U.S., for his gentlemanly, full, clear and lucid explanation and exposition of the proceedings of the individual calling himself the "Rev. H. W. Parsons" who was sent out by the seceding Good Templars of this country ostensibly to mission the colored people in the seceded State of North Carolina, and who hereby disclaim on behalf of the Good Templars of this country any connection or sympathy with the said H. W. Parsons, his agents or employers.
