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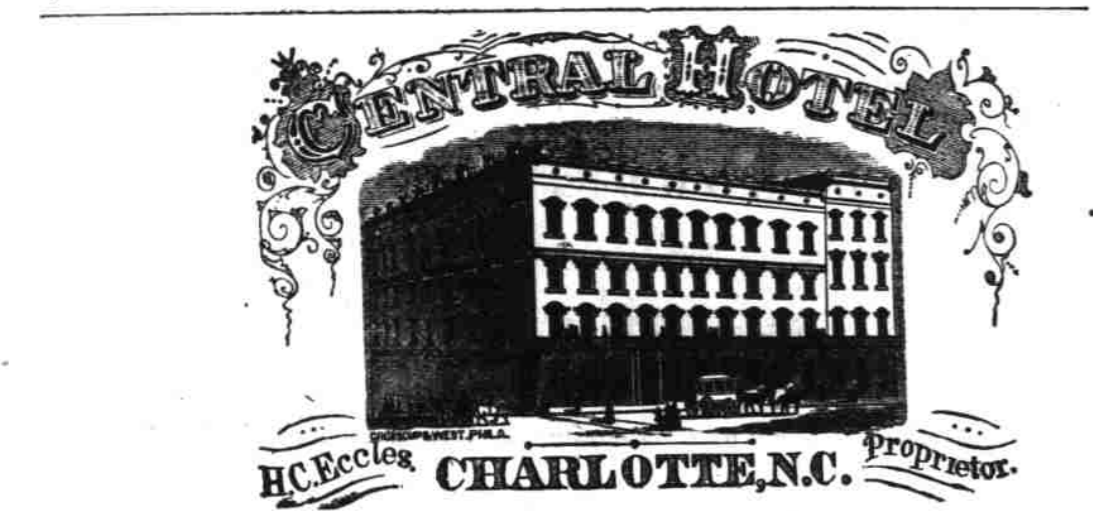

THE RUB AT LAST.

A Compromise Commission for South Carolina and Louisiana.

DEMOCRATS DETERMINED ON RESTORATION OF SOUTHERN SELF-GOVERNMENT.

HAYES DETERMINED.

Troops Shall be Removed from the South.

WASHINGTON, March 8.

The President may send a compromising commission, headed by Vice President Wheeler, to South Carolina and Louisiana. Consternation pervades the Republican breast.

If the people of New Orleans were law-abiding, why should Mr. Packard be afraid to show himself before them? It had been said he claimed an office to which he was not entitled. Mr. Thurman said that at a former session of the Senate, the credentials of J. B. Eustis, claiming to be a Senator from the State of Louisiana, were referred to the committee on privileges and elections. The committee reported against the right of Mr. Eustis, to a seat on the ground that the vacancy had been filled by the election of Pinchback. Subsequently the Senate decided that Pinchback was not elected. He therefore submitted a resolution that the credentials of Mr. Eustis be taken from the table and referred to the committee on privileges and elections. Laid over until to-morrow.

NEW YORK, March 8.—Joe Goss has been arrested on the requisition of the Governor of Kentucky for prize fighting. He is now locked up.
 A Bozeman, Montana Territory telegram of the 16th ult., says: Couriers arrived here to-day, report the appearance of Sitting Bull, Crazy Horse and Dull Knife, with from 1,000 to 2,000 lodges of hostiles, 45 miles from the Crow agency, threatening it. The Crows are said to have stamped on learning of the approach of their foes.

TURKEY AND RUSSIA.

Turkey Accuses Russia of Instigating Insurrection in Bosnia—Ignatieff's Mission to Berlin Fruitless.

LONDON, March 8.—The Standard's Paris special says: It is assured that Turkey has forwarded a circular declaring that Russia has been indirectly waging war against Turkey, and is now instigating insurrection in Bosnia. Gen Ignatieff while at Berlin received no encouragement from Prince Bismarck to go to war.

BOSTON, March 8.—The one hundredth anniversary of the independence of the Maconic Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, was celebrated to-day. Many distinguished Masons from other States were present.
