

DEMOCRATS DETERMINED ON RESTORATION OF SOUTHERN SELF - GOVERNMENT.

WASHINGTON, March 8.

The President may send a compromising commission, headed by Vice President Wheeler, to South Carolina and Louisiana. Consternation pervades the Republican breast.

The extraordinary action of the Senate in deferring the confirmations of the new Cabinet was variously discussed. The President expressed great astonishment. He had not anticipated the unanimous approval of the selectien, but at the same time he thought that they met the approval of the greater portion of the Senate. He added, that he should adhere to the nominations as he had made them. and that the Senate could pursue its own course in the matter; that he had laid down the policy he intended to pursue, and he should carry it into effect. If the Cabinet was not confirmed this week, he said he should proceed in co-operation with the old Cabinet, and issue orders for the withdrawal of troops from the Southern

WASHINGTON, March 8.-In the Sen ate, the motion to refer the credentials tials of Gen. John T. Morgan to the Committee on Privileges and Elections was rejected without dissent. He was sworn in by the Vice President.

The Crows are said to have stampeded on learning of the appreach of their foes.

### TURKEY AND RUSSIA.

#### Turkey Accuses Russia of Instigating Insurrection in Besnia-Ignatieff's Mission to Berlin Fruitless.

London, March 8.-The Standard's Paris special says: It is assured that Turkey has forwarded a circular declaring that Russia has been indirectly waging war against Turkey, and is now instigating insurrection in Bosnia. Gen Ignatieff while at Berlin received no encouragement from Prince Bismarck to go to war.
