WASHINGTON!

TELEGRAM FROM PROMINENT CITIZENS OF LOUISIANA.

Sherman will not Act until his Colleagues are Confirmed.

The new Senators and their Places on the Committees.

KEY CONGRATULATED ON HIS CABINET APPOINTMENT.

Self-Constituted Committees and Office Seekers Awaiting Patiently.

Butler has no Axe to Grind and is a Hayes Man.

The following telegram was received by Senator Bayard to-day:

"SHREVEPORT, La., March 9, 1877. Hon Thos F. Bayard, U. S. Senator, Washington, D. C.:

Packard's dispatch yesterday to Senator Blaine, that in every parish outside of New Orleans, except what he terms the five bulldozed parishes, his government is recognized by all except a few Nicholl's officials is utterly untrue. The people of this parish and surrounding parishes spurn Packard's pretensions, and render hearty allegiance to Gov. Nicholls. The Republican police jury of this parish has by formal resolution recognized the Nicholl's government. (Signed.) Nathan Gregg, President of Shreveport Cotton Exchange. Samuel C. Head, President of Police Jury of Caddo Parish. N. C. Blanchard, President of the Dem. Committee of Caddo Parish. B. M. Johnson, Banker.

All of Hayes' proposed Cabinet are here and have signified a willingness to serve. Sherman declines to act until his colleagues are confirmed. Morrill did not attend the Cabinet on account of delicate health and harsh weather.

The new Senators have places on committees as follows:

Coke, Indian Affairs and Mines. Lamar, Railroads, Education and Transportation. Hill, Revolutionary Claims, Mines, Privileges and Elections. Sanderson, Indian Affairs, District of Columbia and Territories. Harris, Claims, Levees and Transportation.

Morgan, Claims and Patents. Grover, Public Lands, Territories and Enrolled Bills.

McPherson, Manufactures and Naval Affairs. Rollins, Manufactures, Audits and Districts.

Beck, Appropriations, Civil Service, Transportation.

Hoar, Agriculture, Indian Affairs, Claims, Privileges and Elections.

Plumb, Public Lands, and Mines. Kirkwood, Military, Postoffice, and Pensions.

Garland, Public Lands, Territories, Davis, Pensions, Revision of Laws, and Judiciary.

Senator Bruce, of Mississippi, is chairman of the Committee on Levees of the Mississippi river.

No public business.

The President has done practically nothing regarding the dual governments of South Carolina and Louisiana.

Neither has there been action taken in regard to Southern Federal officers, except on the question of Stone for District Attorney of South Carolina, and there is a halt in this because the delegation in Congress prefer W E Earle, who is a native republican and is as equally efficient as Mr Stone.

It is positive that the place of collector of customs at New Orleans has not been tendered to Gov Packard.

Marshall Jewell, ex Postmaster General congratulated Judge Key and the public on Key's nomination.

Letters and telegrams from South Carolina and Louisiana with regard to Federal or State affairs will remain unanswered until Hayes has consulted with his new Cabinet, and the half dozen self and otherwise constituted delegations are patiently heard, and receive in reply some remark about the weather.

General Butler assured Hayes of his support to day. Butler said he had no axes to grind.

Sherman's commission as Secretary of the Treasury was issued to-day.

The German Papers Pleased with Hayes' Inaugural - Blaine and Morton may Crush Themselves.

MILWAUKEE, Wisconsin, March 9.-The German papers, generally, are pleased with Hayes' Inaugural, and the Cabinet. The Sentinel, after complimenting Blaine, Morton and other Republican Senators, for their courage in the past, says that if they oppose themselves to the popular sentiment that has been awakened by the President's inaugural, they are in danger of being crushed beneath it.

LOUISVILLE, March 9.-J. S. Clarke, whiskey dealer, has failed for \$90,000.

Business Men Endorse Hayes' Conciliatory Policy.

St. Louis, March 9.-After 'Change this evening a joint meeting of the merchants and cotton exchanges was held in the chamber of the former, and the following resolution adopted:

"WHEREAS, The sentiments enunciated by the President in his inaugural address and foreshadowed in the appointment of his cabinet indicates a desire and determination to foster a conciliatory and fraternal feeling throughout the Union by such an administrative course as will guarantee to the people good order, and a popular government to each and every section of our common country; therefore be it

Resolved, That as representatives of the business interests of St. Louis, we hereby heartily approve of the just and conservative course thus far marked out by President Hayes, and that our Senators in Congress be urged to rise above all party feeling as patriotism alone should govern their actions.

Heavy Gale in New York-Telegraphic Communications Retarded.

NEW YORK, March 9.-The heavy gale of this morning, seriously interferes with telegraphic communication east of this city, as well as in other directions.

Services were celebrated this morning at the church of St Francis Xavia, where the disaster occurred last night and a large audience was in attendance. The Ave and Pater were offered for the injured.

A heavy southeasterly gale and storm prevailed last night, and continues. The gale is strong in the bay and navigation is slow.

The Approaching Consistory.

LONDON, March 9.-The Times' correspondent at Rome says: "It is believed that the approaching Consistory will read an encyclical upon the condition of the Church in Europe and America. Franciscans are pressing the claims for the canonization of Columbus.
