

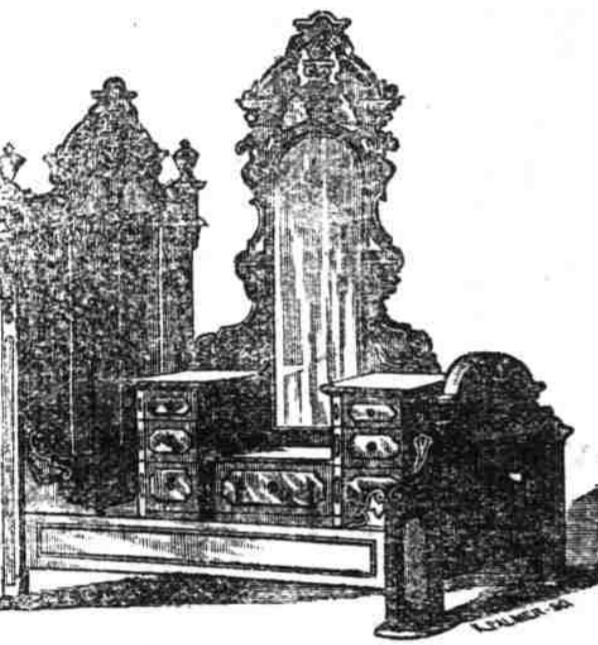

FRED DOUGLAS CONFIRMED.

SOME DEMOCRATIC SENATORS VOTE FOR IT.

OTHER CONFIRMATIONS.

WASHINGTON, March 17. The opposition to Fred Douglas is strong, mainly because he lacks legal knowledge and personal acquaintance with the condition of property in the District. The colored people themselves are opposing the confirmation.

The Tribune's Washington dispatch says: Among the unsuccessful candidates for the United States Marshalship for the Northern District of Illinois, was A. M. T. Stillwell, of Livingston county. The President told him his papers were unexceptionable, but there was an insuperable objection to his appointment to any Federal office; that was, he was a favorite cousin of Mrs. Hayes.

Cautionary Signals continue at Indianola, Galveston, Cape Lookout, Wilmington, Cape Hatteras, Kitty Hawk, Cape Henry, Norfolk, Baltimore, Cape May, Atlantic City, Sandy Hook, Barnegat, New York, New Haven, New London, Newport, Woodstock, Boston, Thatcher Island, Portland and Eastport, and are ordered for New Orleans, Mobile, St. Marks, Jacksonville, Savannah and Charleston.

Allowing the Republicans all they claim, Louisiana, Florida, South Carolina and elsewhere, the XLVth Congress will stand—Democrats, 149; Republicans, 144.

The Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, Conant, is under question, but the charges are indefinite; Secretary Sherman thought yesterday, there was nothing in them.

The President sent two nominations to the Senate, which were omitted yesterday, by a clerical blunder. This closes out the extra session of the Senate.

Secretary Sherman is authority, that there is no foundation, whatever, for the insinuation of questionable practices affecting the honesty of Assistant Secretary Conant.

The Senate, after discussion, agreed, by a vote of 39 to 8, to send a Special Committee to Oregon to investigate Senator Grover's election.

Chas. M. Wilder was confirmed as Postmaster at Columbia, S. C. At 2 P. M., the Senate was still in session.

Midnight.

Time between New York and New Orleans via Atlanta, Knoxville and Lynchburg, will be made, commencing to-morrow in 64 hours and 35 minutes.

Capt William Prince is ordered to the Gulf, as Chief of Ordnance.

A debate of an hour and a half preceded the confirmation of Douglas as Marshal of the District, Senators Conkling and Morgan in favor of and Whyte against it. Hill, Beck, Garland and Morgan voted for confirmation. Lamar was absent.

The additional confirmations were: Castello, Collector of Customs at Natchez, and Goes at St. Augustine. The Records do not show any disposition of Stone, nominated as Marshal for South Carolina.

LATER.—The nomination of Stone as District Attorney for South Carolina, was recommitted and went over on motion of Gen. Gordon. The chief point against him, seems to be incompetency.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The following nominations remain unconfirmed: Hughes, District Attorney for Middle Tennessee; Walden, Marshal for West Tennessee; Roseman, postmaster for Charleston, S. C.; Potts, postmaster for Petersburg.

SENATE.—After the usual formalities the Senate adjourned sine die. The

Star says nearly all the Louisiana politicians who have been in the city for weeks in the interest of the Nicholls government, leave for New Orleans to-night. They have assurances that the order for the withdrawal of troops from South Carolina and Louisiana will be proposed at the Cabinet meeting on Tuesday, next, the army will withdraw to the military reservations on Wednesday.

From the Old World—Turkish War Notes—Author Dead—Von Arnim nearly so.

LONDON, March 17.—The Times in a leading article contrasts the long proposition which preceded the Andrassy notes and the Berlin memorandum, with the celerity of the present negotiations. It says conciliation and promptitude have been the characteristics of all parties, and having resolved to agree, the complaisance is wonderful. The protocol was only communicated to Lord Derby on Sunday, and on Friday we are congratulated as an accomplished work. This shows that whatever the Russian government may propose to accomplish, association with the European powers is looked upon as important, either for external political action, or to allay the irritation and disappointment at home.

Charles Cowder Clarke, lecturer and author, is dead. Count Von Arnim is reported dying at Nice.

Fatal Explosion—Sentenced for Implication in Election Frauds

CINCINNATI, March 17.—A boiler exploded in the saw mill of Hunter & Bros., five miles east of Worthington, Ind., yesterday afternoon, killing 12 persons and wounding seven, all who were in the building. The mill ground corn on Fridays, and was trying a new set of corn burrs. The day being wet neighbors had gathered to witness the experiment.

WORTHINGTON, IND., March 17.—The exploding of a saw mill boiler killed three persons.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., March 17.—The Lackawanna is ordered to Mazatlan, to investigate the detention of American vessels by customs authorities.

NEW YORK, March 17.—Snow fell to the depth of four inches in this city to-day.

Ravages of the Storm.

NORFOLK, VA., March 17.—Put in leaking the schooner Mary E. Camp, from Philadelphia to Charleston, with coal. The brig Liza Belle was disabled in the gale off Cape Hatteras, on the 9th inst., during which her captain, R. A. Watson, was washed overboard while lashed to the wheel. She arrived this evening, having lost her main sail, jib and anchor. She will probably have to discharge cargo and receive repairs before proceeding.

Leading Business Men of New Orleans Guarantee Peace if the Troops are Withdrawn.

NEW ORLEANS, March 17.—Officers of banks, insurance companies, and trade boards, telegraph Hayes assurances that disorders will not follow upon the withdrawal of troops.

The Charleston Military Companies were not forbidden to Celebrate St. Patrick's Day.

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 17.—The St. Patrick parade to-day included all the white military companies, whose appearance in public, under arms, was forbidden on Washington's birthday.

SOUTH CAROLINA NEWS.

It is estimated that not more than 247 mule have been sold in Camden so far this year.

Rev. Dr. Junkin, of Charleston, has accepted an invitation to deliver the baccalaureate sermon before the graduating classes of the Due West College next July.

The election in Barnwell County passed off quietly, and Colonel T. J. Counts was unanimously elected to the State Senate, in the place of the late Senator Williams.

Last Thursday was celebrated in the Due West Female College as Miss McQuern's seventy-fifth birthday. College exercises were suspended a part of the day, and a splendid dinner was given to the faculty and senior class by a number of handsome presents were given to Miss McQuern by her associates and friends, and the day passed off most pleasantly. Miss McQuern has been identified with the College at Due West ever since its foundation.

Hayes' Policy—Appointment of Fred Douglas

A special dispatch to the Richmond Daily says:

The President's appointments since the selection of his Cabinet give little hope to expect an era of reform and pacification. There seems so far to be no disposition to select any better than the machine politicians who made up the Grant dynasty. Some of the last Executive appointments are indecent and scandalous, such as Fred Douglas to be Marshal of this District, and Tyrer, of Indiana, to be First Assistant Postmaster General, and Boutwell, of Mass., to revise the statutes of the United States.

Douglas is an insolent negro, noted for his hatred to the white race. As an oratorical mind out of the Republican party Grant was willing to give him something, but he has never put him, as Hayes has done, into a position of the highest official responsibility. An arrangement is to be made by which he is to be kept out of the customary functions of the marshal in giving introductions at the presidential levees, but the question is fifty put: "If he is not good enough for this, why should he be forced as an associate upon the gentlemen of the bar and many prominent citizens who have business with the U. S. Marshal?" Even the negroes and white Republicans of the District object to Douglas' appointment.

A special patrol for the purpose of looking out for incendiaries is spoken of among the merchants of Camden. The plan is to organize a company of young men, who will do guard duty by turns.
