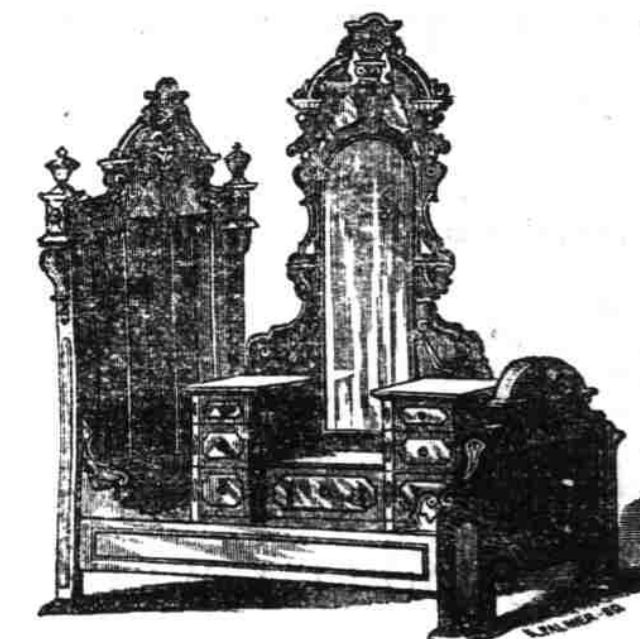

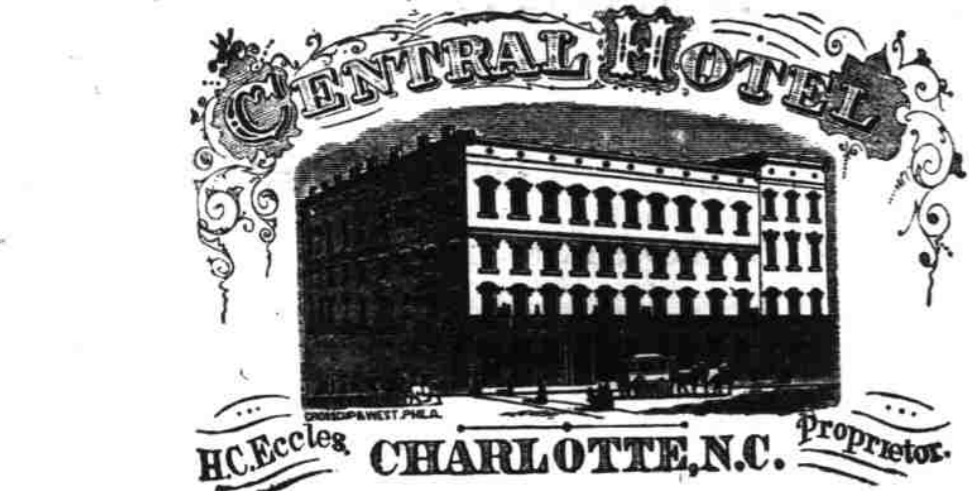

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. WASHINGTON!

The Louisiana Commission at a Stand Still. HAYES DENYING HIMSELF. SECRET CABINET SESSION. SCHURZ GOING TO BERLIN. A Representative Republican Trio in Consultation. FIGHTING OVER THE SPOILS. MEMBERS OF LOUISIANA COMMISSION NOT MADE OUT.

WASHINGTON, March 24. No progress is reported in forming the Louisiana Commission. The following special to the Baltimore Sun, embodies all that is known regarding the President's Southern policy: "The President, with the same wrath, said to a prominent Republican Senator, who called on him to-day, that the South had misunderstood him. He had never said he would withdraw the troops, and had never authorized any one to say so for him. He said that he proposed to do what, in his best judgment, he thought was right, and he did not expect to please every one."

Midnight. WASHINGTON, March 24. It is again reported that Secretary Schurz will probably accept the Mission to Berlin. Morton had a long conversation with the President yesterday, and in company with Everts, had a consultation with him to-day.

Some questions regarding the pay of ante-bellum Mail Contractors have been referred to the Attorney-General, and it is expected that he will decide to pay the Service, ending May 31st, 1861, and direct that the Contractors be paid up to that date. The Commission has been signed by the President, appointing Gen Henry C Wayne Surveyor of the port of Savannah, Ga., but it is held, upon charges against his character, prepared by John E Bogart. The Star says: "Jas Atkins, Collector of Customs at Savannah, Ga., is an applicant for the position of Commissioner of Internal Revenue, and has been here for some time, pressing his claim."

John G Clark, formerly Postmaster at Savannah is an applicant for the Collectorship at that port. Commodore Aaron K Hughes, succeeds Commodore Cox in command of the Naval Station at Port Royal. The Cabinet had a two hour's session, mainly devoted to the Civil Service Regulations for the entire country. Such progress was made as warrants promulgation early next week. It is authoritatively stated this P. M., that the membership of the Louisiana Commission, with the exception of Gov Brown, has not been determined upon. Col Atkins says the Star is mistaken in saying he is an applicant for the position of Commissioner of Internal Revenue. He also says ex Postmaster Clark, of Savannah, is not an applicant for Atkins' place as Collector of the port of Savannah. It is likely the appointment of Marshall for Georgia, will not be made for some time, and Smyth's commission having expired, he is appointed ad interim by the court.

MASSACHUSETTS. A New Lodge of Good Templars. BOSTON, March 24.—Owing to the recent action of the Grand Lodge of Good Templars of Massachusetts, excluding colored men from membership, a movement is now on foot to establish a new lodge by the dissatisfied members.

NEW JERSEY. Caught Again. NEWARK, March 24.—Sumerville, the New York lawyer, who was implicated in the Washington safe burglary, has been arrested for an attempt to defraud the Treasury of a quarter of million dollars. He is held on \$10,000 bail.

L. LOUISIA A. New Orleans Unanimously for Nicholls—Meetings Denouncing the Report that the Business Men of Louisiana will be Content with Packard as Governor.

NEW ORLEANS, March 24.—A general meeting of the New Orleans Exchange, the largest ever held, adopted preambles and resolutions, endorsing the Nicholls government. The Commissioner has filed a claim in the Circuit Court, for \$15,000 for sewing machine warrants issued during the last campaign. District Attorney Lacy resists the claim, asking proof that the services were performed in the interest of right and justice. He pleads that the warrants were issued for political purposes, and with a view to the pecuniary benefit of the plaintiff.

The proceedings of the Cotton Exchange meeting were telegraphed to President Hayes. It is stated that a meeting will be held by the Chamber of Commerce, Mercants' Exchange, Stock Exchange, Board of Trade, and Clearing House Association, in contradiction of the assertion that the business men here would be satisfied with Packard for Governor. Meetings are called here and throughout the State to endorse and pledge the support of Nicholls.

THE EASTERN MUDDLE. Russia and England Still a Sea—An Immediate Settlement of the Eastern Question Unfavorable—Interesting English Boat Race.

LONDON, March 24.—The Post's Berlin correspondent says: "Russia invites the other powers to mediate between herself and the English Cabinet over the protocol. The Vienna correspondent of the Times says: The impression that an ultimate understanding will be reached immediately, has vanished. A general debate on the Eastern question commenced yesterday. The first announcement was a victory for Oxford, by less than a half length. The latest advices make the head dead. The matter is in controversy. Betting at the start was five to four in favor of Oxford. The race was said to have been the grandest ever rowed. The lookers-on seem unanimous that the Oxford won by a yard or two. Oxford's bow oar was broken near the finish."

NEW YORK. Tweed to be Released—Why Onkey Hall Went Abroad. NEW YORK, March 24.—The Times says that it is definitely settled that Tweed will be released in a few days. Walter C Adams, formerly of the Star Line of Texas Packets, latterly commission merchant, 181 Pearl st., has failed. Liabilities, \$600,000, mostly held abroad.

It is generally believed that Mayor Hall went abroad, fearing further complications with the old ring. The proposed release of Tweed, is upon the surrender of all his property and choses in action. This, by a careful examination, is found to be only a quarter million of dollars, and is supposed to all Tweed has. This is one of a series of compromises with the ring. Some are already made, and others are in progress. Whiting, who robbed the Brooklyn bank, committed and on trial, still refuses to say what he did with the missing \$10,000.

VIRGINIA. Launching of an Excursion Ship from the Norfolk Yard. NORFOLK, March 24.—The mammoth excursion steamer Rockaway, just completed at the ship, building establishment of George W Beach, was successfully launched this evening and was witnessed by an immense throng of citizens who are taking a deep interest in the success of the extensive ship building industry but recently started here. The Rockaway was built for R Cornell White, of New York, and is intended to ply between that city and Rockaway beach. She is 298 feet long, and is said to have more carrying capacity than any other vessel engaged in the excursion business in America. The Rockaway will leave for New York to-night in tow of the steamer Wyandotte. Ship building here has proven a success, and several other large vessels are now on the way and in contemplation.

FLASHES. TROY, N. Y., March 24.—The National Bank of Gloversville, has closed doors. Two-thirds of the capital is tied up in worthless paper. CHICAGO, Ill.—The Democratic City Convention will run Perry H Smith for Mayor. CINCINNATI, O., March 24.—Mayor George W Johnson was re-nominated by the Democrats. BOSTON, Mass., March 24.—Albert Brown, Cashier of the First National Bank of Springfield, Vermont, has defaulted for \$30,000.
