

DIPLOMATIC DRIVES.

Candidates for the New Orleans Custom House Berth.

THE LOUISIANA COMMISSION NOT LAWFULLY CREATED.

Declining the Honor.

WASHINGTON, March 26. It is somewhat positively asserted that the Louisiana Commission is recruited by the Hon Wayne McVeigh, of Pennsylvania.
