WASHINGTON, March 27. The area of the low barometer has moved slowly northeastward, and is now central, over New York. Cautionary signals continue from Smithville to Eastport.

The Observer at Cape Henry reports the Norwegian bark, Pantzer, in a bad condition and full of water. She will probably go to pieces. The crew, 11 all told, is saved.

The Winchester, at last high water, has been moved about a length. They continue to heave ballast overboard at the rate of one hundred to one hundred and fifty tons per day. The sea and wind are very high, and unfavorable to speedy work, but the ship remains in good condition and position.
