WASHINGTON ITEMS.

THE EXTRA SESSION OF CONGRESS JUNE FOURTH.

OFFICIAL ORDER FOR THE REMOVAL OF TROOPS FROM THE STATE HOUSE AT COLUMBIA.

WASHINGTON, April 5. The Republican threaten the Democratic side of the Senate with being aided and abetted hereafter by Senator Patterson.

It is intimated that the pacification of Louisiana is to be postponed until after 15th of May, when it is proposed to organize the XLVth Congress.

The administration is not entirely emotional; a strata of subtlety out-crops here and there.

It begins to appear that the exigencies of the Navy Department require that Congress should assemble as early as May 15th. There are three months pay due that branch of the service.

The family of Postmaster Key will not come to Washington. Of this subject, the Chattanooga Times speaking of the Postmaster-General, says: "His identity with Chattanooga and the esteem in which his family are held, would cause a protest so earnest and general, that they would certainly yield."

Midnight. WASHINGTON, April 5. To Gen W S Hancock, Commanding Military Division of the Atlantic, New York City:

GENERAL: I now have the honor to enclose you certified copies of the letters of the Hon Secretary of War, of April 3rd, inst., and of the President of the United States of the same date, ordering the withdrawal of the troops of the United States, from the State House at Columbia, South Carolina, on Tuesday next, at 12 o'clock, M.

Chamberlain leaves for Columbia tomorrow. Secretary Thompson returns with his family in a few days, when he will make a tour of inspection to the Atlantic Coast Navy Yards. He announced that he would use what money remains to the credit of the navy to pay account for the necessities of the families of officers abroad.

ILLINOIS.

Combination of Whiskey Dealers. Chicago, April 5.—The whiskey retailers of the country have entered into a combination calculated to place the price of their products on what may be considered a profitable basis, and at the same time above suspicion of crookedness.

DELAWARE.

Heavy Loss by Fire. WILMINGTON, April 5.—The fire in Jessup & Moore's paper mills yesterday, was more serious than when first reported. The loss is now estimated at from \$200,000 to \$300,000, upon which there is a \$125,000 insurance, divided among fifteen companies.

NEW YORK.

A Oakley Hall in London—Coal Companies Limiting the Product—Fatal Explosion.

New York, April 5.—A London dispatch reports an interview with Oakley Hall and fully confirms the associated press reports that the Victoria's passenger was Hall. The interviewer says: We had a long interview, but he absolutely refuses to make any explanations whatever as to his motives in leaving New York, under such extraordinary circumstances, and seems altogether at sea as to his future plans.

The coal companies have adopted a plan limiting the product of coal by each. The plan proposes eight million tons for competitive points, during 1877.

An explosion occurred at 10:30 this morning, by which Mr George W Jewett, of the firm of John Jewett & Sons, manufacturers of white lead, was instantly killed, and his brother Mr Orville Jewett, fatally wounded; also, another member of the firm, Mr Jas Dean, was wounded in the leg, but his injuries are not dangerous.

Utica, April 5.—The Very Rev Fath er Benaventure Keller, Provincial of the Franciscan Fathers, from New York to the Mississippi, died in this city to-day.

LOUISIANA.

Packard will die in the Last Ditch, but the People Rally to and support Nicholls.

New Orleans, April 5.—Packard made a speech in the caucus to-day, saying he would insist on his claim to the Governorship to the bitter end.

NATCHEZ, Miss., April 5.—An enthusiastic meeting in Vandalia, Louisiana, to-day, adopted resolutions, pledging their taxes, and unqualified support to the Nicholls government.

GEORGIA.

An Atlanta Man in Trouble—Too Great a Love for Diamonds the Cause.

New York, April 5.—Geo Sharp, Jr., a diamond merchant of Atlanta, Ga., is missing. A cursory investigation shows that he owes to the street brokers over fifty thousand dollars, for which he had pledged to the amount of sixty thousand dollars worth of diamonds. He got possession of all these diamonds before he disappeared.
