THE EASTERN MUDDLE.

Austria's Journals on Her Situation—Her Safety Lies in Opposing Russia—Shipping News—Stocks Dull.

LONDON, April 16.—Col Valentine Baker is on the staff of Pasha Abdul Kerim, commander in chief, who has gone to the Danube.

The Standard's special from Pesth, says: All the journals have agreed that it is impossible for Austria and Hungary to remain neutral in the war which impends.

The steamer Labrador from Havre, which sails from Plymouth yesterday for New York, is the first ship under a foreign flag, clearing from England, with steerage passengers embarked at an English port.

At the Stock Exchange to-day, business is flat at Saturday's worst prices for international stocks. In the House of Lords this afternoon, the Earl of Granville criticised the Government's policy touching the Eastern Question.

Lord Derby, in reply, vindicated the protocol. He said he believed that the House would agree with him, that under existing circumstances, it was best not to say anything concerning the future.

PENNSYLVANIA.
