

### THE EASTERN MUDDLE

Austria's Journals on Her Situation--Her safety Lies in Opposing Russia-Shipping News-

LONDOL, April 16.-Col Valentine Baker is on the staff of Pasha Abdul Kerim, commander in chief, who has gone to the Danube.

The Standard's special from Pesth, says: All the journals have agreed that it is impossible for Austria and Hungary to remain neutral in the war which impends. They unanimously argue in favor of an alliance with England against Russia. Austria and Hungary are even more interested than England in preventing the entrance of the Russians into Bulgaria.

The bark Mercury from New York to Queenstown, went shore while entering that harbor, and is not likely to come off. The crew were saved.

The steamer Labrador from Havre. which sails from Plymouth yesterday for New York, is the first ship under a foreign flag, clearing from England, with steerage passengers embarked at an English port.

At the Stock Exchange to-day, business is flat at Saturday's worst prices for international stocks.

In the House of Lords this afternoon, the Earl of Granville criticised the Government's policy teuching the Eastern Question. He said the protocol was nearly the same as the Berlin memorandum, and why did not the Government accept that? The united action of Europe at that time might have prevented a war. Neither Russia nor Turkey had taken an irretrievable position. He attacked the Minister's boats about raising England's position abroad, which now subjects them to ridicule, and he advocated an European concert for the better government of Turkey.

Lord Derby, in reply, vindicated the protocol. He said he believed that the House would agree with him, that under existing circumstances, it was best not to say anything concerning the
