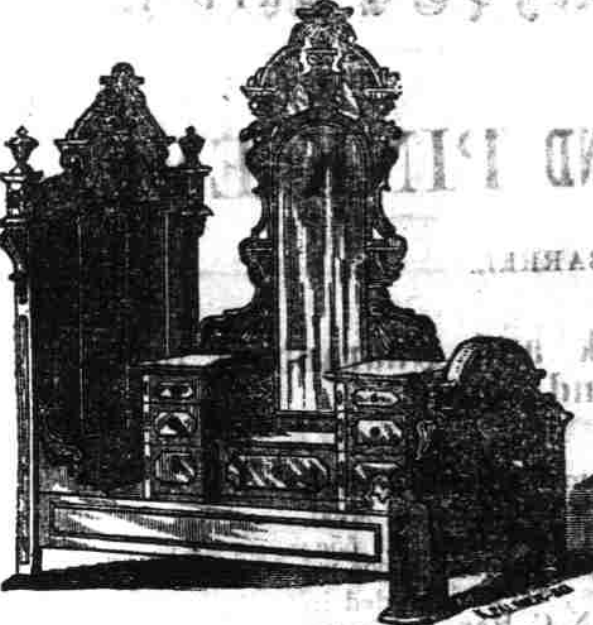

TURKEY CONTRADICTS.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM PACKARD.

GEN HAWLEY ON THE SITUATION IN LOUISIANA.

PACKARD GREATLY AT A DISADVANTAGE.

The Turkish Minister has received an official communication of the reports of disturbances at various points in Turkey, and the destruction of the Turkish army. Packard has levelled another letter at the President, in which he complains that the Democrats refuse to agree to a meeting of all the members of the rival Legislatures holding certificates of the returning board, and allow this body to decide which is the legal government. Packard calls this the President's plan, and adroitly seeks to place the Democrats in the attitude of defying the Commission. The Nicholls legislature yesterday issued a series of pacificatory resolutions, that are spoken of as a part of the plan of compromise, and the latest advice are that it is proceeding satisfactorily.

Frank N. Richardson, the Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun, now on emergency duty at New Orleans, telegraphs the following, which everybody here believes: "In conversation with General Hawley to-night, he stated that it was possible the Commission might be here a week longer, as the members had determined to exhaust every effort to secure a harmonious adjustment of the Legislatures. A proposition of the Nicholls government to this end will probably be submitted to Packard to-morrow. If he rejects that, another may be made, but by neither of them can Packard obtain control of the Legislature. As far as securing any legal settlement through the process of the State Courts, General Hawley says that is out of the question, as the status of the Courts is just as much at issue as that of the Legislature. General Hawley says, if the Commission finally concludes that no adjustment can be effected, they will have nothing left but to report the fact to the President. He says that Gov. Nicholls is exhibiting a commendable spirit. If the mission of himself and his associates should prove a failure, the President will then determine whether to remove the troops or retain them here, with a purpose merely to prevent the shedding of blood, but in no other manner to interfere between the contestants."

Midnight.

WASHINGTON, April 17. Two monitors left Norfolk to-day for Washington, in tow of the Tallahassee.

A steamer dispatch will sail shortly for Constantinople for use of the United States Minister there.

The Treasury will pay all sums under \$50 in silver when desired, otherwise, dollar bills will be issued. The banks complain of a glut in silver.

Four persons in Green county, Penn., and two in St. Louis, making a combination of counterfeiters, have been arrested.

The extra session of Congress is again questioned.

The Cabinet discussed the extra session of Congress. It had been concluded to call the session June 4th, but to-day, calling it the 15th of May, or dispensing with it altogether, were considered at some length, without ordering any change in the original programme.

The situation in Louisiana was also considered, but it was decided that no present action would be proper, officially.

LOUISIANA.

The Nicholls House will accept the Commission's First Proposition as a Legislative Organization.

NEW ORLEANS, April 17.—The Nicholls House concurred favorably on the proposition to organize the House on the basis first proposed, by the Commission. The roll call of the Nicholls Legislature, omitting the seven members since seated, as subject to contest, the result will be 63 Democrats, and 57 Republicans. The Commission will seek the President's approval of this plan before submitting it to Packard.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Lowndesville Prisoners Relieved.

COLUMBIA, S. C., April 17th.—The ten Lowndesville murderers, colored, sentenced to be hanged on next Friday, have been relieved by Gov. Hampton for two weeks.

No developments to-day in case of States officers.

NEW YORK.

Tweed's Last Confession Relentless—Justice Overtakes at Last—Why Oakley Hall Went to England—Many Prominent Men Implicated.

New York, April 17.—Tweed has made a confession going back to '67. Oakley Hall's name figures in the narrative. Many names, and the corrupt expenditure of much money are mentioned. The names include Woodin, Frost, Ellwood, Brand, Winslow, Wood Blood and Morgan, all members of the State Senate. It gives the circumstances of the division of the spoils between himself, Sweeney, Hall, Connally and Woodward. It implicates Garvey, Ingersoll, Davidson, Watson and a majority of the members of the board of supervisors. Among them are Joe Fox, James Hayes, Henry Smith and Isaac J. Oliver. Mayor Hall's proposition was ten per cent. He shared throughout in all the profits, was in full collusion with the various details of fraud, and was fully aware of the fraudulent nature of the contracts presented for his signature.

Tweed says he gave Hugh Hastings a check for \$20,000, and for smaller sums. Mr. Hugh Hastings brought Mr. Jay Gould to him, continues Mr. Tweed: The circumstances of the arrangement between himself, Gould and Fisk, by which the Erie classification bill was passed, which practically enabled the Gould directory of the road to continue indefinitely in power, until the bill was repealed, are well known. In return for this, the Erie influence, though Gould and Fisk was used in behalf of Tweed and his associates. The confession concludes with the promise that the writer will be a witness for the city in any suit brought by the city for the recovery of moneys from any of the persons mentioned. He does not ask that suits against him be quashed, but that he be released from confinement without bail. Great excitement prevails among politicians and others over the confession as published. Hugh Hastings says, in reference to his receiving thirty thousand dollars, by check in 1870 from Tweed, to pay to Senator Woodin, that he received the check as stated, but Woodin had nothing whatever to do with it. It was purely a business transaction between Tweed and himself in the stock breaking line. He admitted bringing Jay Gould and Tweed together at that time. Tweed was considered highly respectable. Justice Birby denies that his brother, Senator Birby, ever proposed immunity to Tweed, in 1871, provided he would have \$150,000 of Jas O'Brien's claims against the city audited and paid. It is a falsehood from beginning to end, said the Judge.

ALBANY, April 17.—The Tweed statement published this morning creates considerable amusement about the capitol and is pronounced a Senatorial guard. The Attorney General has received a paper in connection with Tweed's case, but says he has not time to read it until he can become acquainted with its contents. He will not make it public. Recorder Hackett declined to say anything about the statement that this house, painting and book case were paid for by the city money. Wheeler H. Preckham, of the counsel for the people in the Tweed case to-day, said that it was true that Tweed had made a statement which he called a full confession, and that it was taken to Albany last night by Mr. Townsend. The synopsis in the world was, he supposed substantially correct, it contained some things at least which he knew were correct.

The Express says of the Tweed statement, that the tale told, is but a partial revelation, and the full confession will be an amount of detail which will add even more sickening to the public conscience.

THE EASTERN MUDDLE

How the Russian Army will Probably attack—Declaration of War on 21st of April—Specie Increase—Failure.

LONDON, April 17.—The Russian army will probably advance in the following order: The right wing, which is the weakest portion, crosses the Danister at Chatign, and goes along the Austrian frontier to Pashany. The centre goes by rail to Pashany, and the left wing, the strongest will cross the Danube between Rona and Ismal.

St. PETERSBURG, April 17.—Ignatieff will accompany the Czar to Kischeneff. It is expected that war will be declared at Kischeneff on April the 21st.

BERLIN, April 17.—Specie increase 6800,000 marks.

LIVERPOOL, April 17.—Lockhart & Demeter, commission merchants, metal brokers and insurance agents, have failed. Liabilities not ascertained.

A Reuter dispatch from St. Petersburg says: The Czar leaves for the army almost immediately. He will confine himself to inspecting the troops, and will not take part in the campaign. The order of the day, announcing a declaration of war, has not been issued in official quarters. It is presented that the present situation, compels Russia, in a certain degree, to act single handed. Russia alone, among the great powers, have mobilized. The abrupt manner in which

the Porte rejected the protocol, would make demobilization on Russia's part appear like a retreat. Turkey, as it is pointed out, desires a conflict, and forces on a war. In her circular note, she not only rejected the protocol, but in principle, denied to the European powers the right and faculty of urging in any way, internal reforms in Turkey, or demanding guarantees for the execution and control of these ameliorations. Thus, an entirely new state of things has been created by Turkey, by which even the basis of the conference has been set aside. Russia, who mobilized with the view to prevent the advance of the crescent to Belgrade to obtain reforms in Turkey, insuring the security to the Christians, and guarantees for the execution and control of the measures of reform, has given, during the last five months, a rare example of her pacific intentions and conciliatory endeavors. Turkey having rejected any opportunity of giving a pacific turn to affairs, now gives forward a decision by arms. It is concluded that Russia, who is now in arms has manifested her desire for peace, but cannot retreat.
