WASHINGTON!

SOME MEMBERS GROWING IMPATIENT.

E. CASS CARPENTER'S RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

Large Sale of Four and a Half Bonds.

WASHINGTON, April 19.

Gen. George A. Sheridan had a two hours' interview with the President last night. Some members of the Administration are becoming impatient, and urge the President to withdraw the troops at once. It is now generally believed that Packard and his friends have no hope whatever of maintaining themselves, and are only prolonging the unhappy condition of the State to put money in their pockets, by "bullying" and "beating" her securities.

It is stated that the President has accepted the resignation of L. C. Carpenter as Collector of Internal Revenue in the Charleston (S. C.) District. Secretary Sherman will oppose any interference with the present financial laws at the extra session. He may recommend some action to facilitate the pending operations. He has no information that the pending European war has affected the demand for 4 1/2 per bonds. The sale of these bonds now amount to a million daily, and the Secretary contemplates suspending their issue, and placing a 4 per cent on the market.

WASHINGTON, April 19.

There is a returning board quorum in both branches of the Nicholls' Legislature to-day.

There has been no appointment of Collector of Customs for Mobile to-day.

The bond of Mr Humphreys, who was appointed Collector of Customs at Pensacola, if faulty at all, is only technically so on account of the unsettled values in Florida. Three of the four bondsmen are good for the amount. There is no taint of fraud. The fourth name could not be recalled by the officer who handled the bond before it was returned to Mr Humphreys for amendment.

Gilbert C Walker, of Virginia, has gone to the Pacific coast. He will remain until his presence in the extra session of Congress calls him home.

In this connection it may be mentioned that there is a strong pressure to postpone Congress until September, giving Hayes' Southern policy time to crystallize itself.

The army can struggle along until August without violating the law.

It is learned incidentally that one of the Mobile heads has fallen to-day. Whose it is, cannot be ascertained, beyond that it is not the Collector of Customs.

It is now stated that the administration itself will inaugurate the judicial question regarding Secretary Robeson's mismanagement of the navy department.

LOUISIANA.

A Correction in Warmouth's Speech—Packard's Caucus declines the Proposition of Nicholls' House—Still Hopeful of a Final Settlement.

NEW ORLEANS, April 19.—Warmouth requests the following correction of his remarks before the caucus. After the words "honorably discharged," strike out down to the word "test," and insert this: "We will have no difficulty in waiting the final determination of this issue." Warmouth says his speech was in defence of the President.

The Commission has received the resolutions of the Packard caucus declining the proposals of Nicholls' House for re-organizing the Legislature. They will report to the President the failure so far of adjustment, and will remain and make further efforts to effect a settlement. Though the present plan would seem to have failed, it may be fairly stated that the Commission and prominent leaders on both sides still entertain a hope, that seems alike honorable to all parties may yet be agreed upon.

P J Watson, of Madison, E J Walker, of Texas and S Oliver of Concordia, returning board members of the legislature, were seated in the Nicholls House to-day. This completes a returning board quorum in both Houses. The Packard legislature is rapidly dissolving. There are now 85 or 90 returning board members in the Nicholls House.

At a meeting of the citizens of Cincinnati yesterday, a committee was appointed to form a company to lease the Cincinnati and Southern Railroad under the provisions of the common carrier's bill.

NEW YORK.

The Senatorship and Deal Hitch in the Louisiana Question—Warmouth Fighting for Himself—The Commission Making a Full Report.

NEW YORK, April 19.—The Herald's New Orleans special says: The truth is, that the whole hitch grows out of the strife for two United States Senatorships. The eighteen or twenty Democratic candidates have calculated the chances very closely, and do not intend to expose themselves to the chances of defeat, which might exist if the Legislature was organized with only four Democratic majority on joint ballot; there being included two independents, and some shaky members. On the other hand, Warmouth hopes to unite the whole Republican element in his favor, and thus receive his own election. He therefore, is making a gallant fight in his own interest, in which he is sustained by Packard, McMillan, and all the other prominent leaders.

Gov Brown stated this evening, his belief that the delay and consequent hitch in the proceedings, had been caused by the operations of a bond ring in Gov Brown's private room.

At midnight, Gov Nicholls was engaged with Gen Gibson and others, preparing a letter endorsing the resolutions adopted by the Democratic Legislature in regard to the abolition of all race distinction, and general political amnesty; and pledging himself personally to their education, which letter is to be embodied in the report to be made to the President.

Gen Harlan in an interview states, that the Commission is making its full report to-night. He does not think the Commission will leave before Friday or Saturday, but regards the whole affair as happily settled.

Paul Valentine Italian, ex-President of and at one time a professor in the Drew Theological Seminary at Madison, N J, and latterly, who opened a Methodist Church here, and afterwards was proprietor of a school and boarding house, was convicted to-day in General Sessions Court of committing indecent assaults; sentenced to the State prison for ten years.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

The Sealed Doors—No forcible Attempt made to break the Seals—Awaiting the Action of the Supreme Court.

COLUMBIA, April 19.—No objection has been made to sealing the State Bureaux over which there are contests. The seal consists of a few inches of red tape fastened at either end to the door and door-post by a drop of sealing-wax, which bears the impress of the secretary's private signet ring.—Dunn, Cardozo and Hayne, the Republican Comptroller General, Treasurer and Secretary of State, respectively, remained at home in anticipation of what was done. Adjutant and Inspector General Kennedy, Superintendent of Education Tabert, and Attorney General Elliott, however, presented themselves at their late offices at the usual morning hour, and were denied admittance. A show of resistance was made by the two last named, but upon being confronted by the constables and assured that they would be arrested if they essayed to force an entrance, as they seemed inclined to do, they, too, retired to await the decision of the Supreme Court in the matter of disputed possession.

FLASHES FROM THE WIRES.

No more bodies found yesterday in the ruins of the St Louis fire. The office safes with very valuable contents uninjured.

The rates of freights from St Louis to Eastern cities and the seaboard, are about to be raised.

Fifteen hundred coopers of the Standard Oil Company of Cleveland, Ohio, have struck for higher wages.

GP Pelham, formerly Professor in old South Carolina College, and more recently editor of several leading newspapers in South Carolina, died at Columbia, of typhoid pneumonia.

Dr B Thompson Baird has resigned the Secretaryship of the Board of Publication of Presbyterian General Assembly at Richmond. Rev Wm A Campbell, of Virginia, has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

THE EASTERN MUDDLE

Russia Issues a Manifesto to the Army and to Europe—The Europeans and Asiatic War Policy of Russia.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 19.—It is rumored that the Porte intends to proclaim a state of siege. Greece is preparing in case of war, to incite insurrection in the Greek provinces of Turkey and Crete.

PARIS, April 19.—Couriers bearing a Russian manifesto addressed to the Army of the Nation and to Europe will start simultaneously with the Czar, and arrive at its destination the same time the Czar arrives. Kichenoff on

receiving this charge de affairs, will withdraw from Constantinople.

LONDON, April 19.—A special to the Times confirms the Paris dispatch regarding the manifesto, and adds: Russia seems determined to avoid a real declaration of war. Her troops in Europe will remain on the defensive, but in Asia it is believed she will commence hostilities, at the latest, at the end of next week.

At the Stock Exchange there is an important recovery in prices on continental buying and purchases to recover the recent speculative sales.

A Reuter telegram from Orsova says: The Roumanian troops are concentrating in Little Wallachia, the greater portion being despatched to Kalafit.
