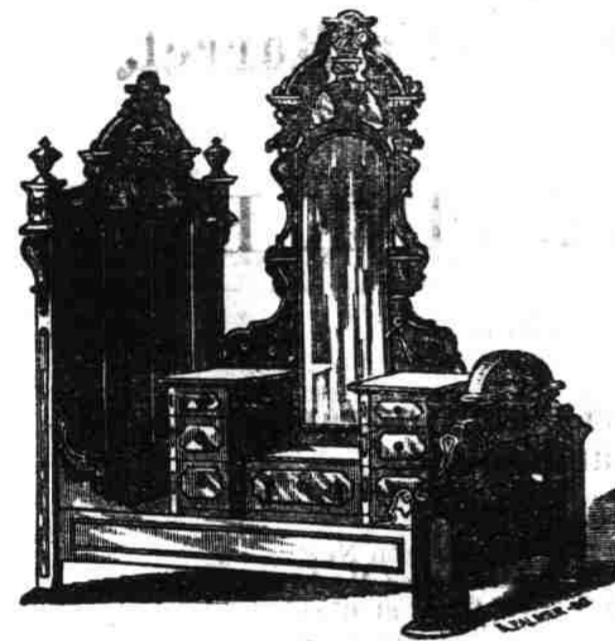

PACKARD TO VACATE TO-DAY

WASHINGTON, April 23.

Ben Wade has succeeded in finding a publication for his letter, attacking Hayes' Southern policy...

The New Orleans Republican concludes an article on the situation: "Gov Packard has patiently waited day by day for that aid, which, according to his understanding of the Constitution of the United States, was his unquestionable due..."

No information can be obtained regarding the balance of the unexpended appropriation for Rivers and Harbors. All paragraphs on this matter have been based upon a favorable hearing accorded to persons in favor of special interests. The War Department takes special pains to conceal its intentions.

Reports relative to farm animals as received at the Department of Agriculture, show a general exemption from diseases among the cattle, with a few exceptions, and a more than average healthfulness and thrift, especially in the region North of the 36th of latitude. In the milder regions, where shelter is not provided, emaciation and death are not unfrequently reported. In one county in Georgia (Taylor) one hundred and fifty of a herd of five hundred were lost. Occasionally, cases of lung fever are reported from the Northern latitudes and from the South. More frequent mention of similar diseases and local losses from blind staggers and less frequent loss from glanders, and in the Mississippi Valley a few cases of catarrh.

Sheep generally, are in a good condition. In Southern California, flocks are dying from droughts, and in some places are sold to go Oregon and Nevada for 37 cents per head. The losses of swine have been very heavy in the West and South, particulars of which will be given in another report. The great plains, not exceeding 7 per cent. of the returns, indicate a low condition. Cases of pleuro-pneumonia have occurred in Burlington, New Jersey; Baltimore, Maryland; and Cumberland, Pennsylvania.

Cases of abortion are scattered throughout the dairy districts in no greater numbers than usual, and local losses are reported in the South from diseases, resulting from miasma and lack of nutrition. Such losses vary from 2 to 20 per cent. in the counties of the Gulf States, and from 5 to 25 per cent. in certain counties in Texas. No prevalent disease is reported among horses. A few cases of a mild form of catarrhal disease are reported.

The Star says: "It is among the rumors on the street, that the President will appoint Gov Packard, of Louisiana, to be Collector of the Port of New Orleans."

Gov Colquitt, with Senator Gordon, had an interview with the President to-day. The President seemed glad to hear how well Georgia was getting along.

Blaine says the story, that he intends to introduce a resolution in next

Congress, questioning Hayes' election, is the invention of an idiot. Mr Stephens rode out to-day. He called on Speaker Randall, Mr Adams, Clerk of the House, and the President. Mr Hayes came to the portico of the White House and conversed with Mr Stephens, who remained in the carriage. It was the first meeting of these gentlemen, and the conversation was confined to topics of courtesy.

Ex-Gov Warmouth telegraphs a friend here, that Packard will vacate the St. Louis Hotel to-morrow. Rear Admiral Preble writes from Panama, under date of April 10th, that affairs on the Isthmus are peaceful.

THE EASTERN WAR. Russian Consulate Attacked by Turks - The Russian Money Market - Austria not Obligated to any Course - Russia Favors a Slight Delay - Mr Mitchell Released.

London, April 23. - A Fern dispatch to the Times announces that the Russian Consulate at Kars has been attacked by some disorderly Turkish soldiers. The inmates were rescued by Turkish troops after a slight affray.

A dispatch from Berlin to the Times says: "The semi-official press are again exceedingly hostile. Turkey demands that Serbia participate in the war."

The actual condition of the Russian money market, may be gathered from the St Petersburg Pan Slavist Journal. The Novye Vremja recommends the government to raise a heavy foreign loan, even at a loss of 40 per cent. rather than multiply its paper money indefinitely. Even now the depreciation of paper is so great, and progresses so rapidly, that coin has risen from 4 to 6 roubles. The rumor of a loan is premature. There have been negotiations for one, but nothing will be absolutely settled until the war is regarded as inevitable.

The Times correspondent with the Turkish army states that ten thousand men from Widdin have gone Eastward toward the seat of war.

The Times Belgrade dispatch has the following: "Despite the assertion of the Russian telegraphic agency that a perfect understanding has been arrived at between Russia and Austria. Relative to Eastern affairs, there can be no manner of doubt that the Austrian semi-official organs, which positively deny the existence of such an understanding, are correct, and that Austria reserves to itself the absolute liberty of action."

A dispatch from Paris to the Times says: "The occupation of Jassy by Russian troops, which was announced for Monday, is confirmed by the latest news. Every arrangement is being made to secure their unobstructed possession of the Roumanian railway. The Russian telegraphic agency's telegram, dated Sunday evening says: 'The Porte calls on Serbia for leave to occupy its frontiers at Gladova, to prevent the passage of the Russians.'

A courier arrived at Vienna Sunday night with Gorschakoff's circular. Cardinal Vannicelli Cosonia, Archbishop of Ferrara is dead. It appears that Russia will delay the development of her intentions until the 29th inst. The chief reason being that her preparations are not quite complete, and the roads are very bad. It is also stated that Russia finds that a larger force is required for the task before her than she supposed.

The Sultan in case of war will go to the Danube to command in person. The King of Abyssinia has released Mr Mitchell, the American geographer.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 23. - The Russian Charge d'Affairs, and the whole staff of the Russian embassy and consulate, will leave Constantinople this evening for Odessa on the imperial yacht, Heriklik.

LONDON, April 23. - A Reuter telegram from Paris to-night states that Prince Orloff, the Russian Ambassador has received Gorschakoff's circular announcing Russia's reasons for declaring war. He proceeded to the French foreign office at 2 o'clock this afternoon to communicate the circular to the Duke De Cases. The declaration of war is expected to-morrow. The dispatch of the Grand Vizier to Prince Charles of Roumania, has produced a great impression. It is believed that Roumania intends to consult to guarantee powers as to the course she should pursue.

NEW YORK. Fire in a Newspaper Office - \$25,000 Loss - Death of a Prominent Mason.

New York, April 23. - A fire was discovered this morning in the composing room of the Journal of Commerce on Hanover street extending from Beaver to Pearl, and before the flames were extinguished, the two upper floors were burned. The lower floors, occupied by the Peerless Oil Works Company, Nourse & Brooks, and other firms are damaged, by the water. The publication rooms and presses of the printing office are also injured by the water. The loss is estimated at \$25,000.

ROCHESTER, April 23. - Gen. W. E. Lathrop, aged 83, died on Sunday. He

was a prominent Mason for sixty years, and Commander of the Grand Commandery of the United States.

ALBANY, April 23. - The examination into the affairs of the American Popular Life Insurance Company, develops fraud and perjury on the part of the officers.

PORTLAND, OREGON, April 23. - Lieut J. L. Knapp, Surgeon Andrew, and Post Suttler Moore of Fort Canby, left the mouth of the Columbia for Astoria in an open boat, which was capsized. All are undoubtedly lost.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23. - The Alaska brought 950 Chinese with small pox. She is quarantined. The small pox was epidemic in Hong Kong.
