TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.
WASHINGTON!
FORBIDDING POOL SELLING
 Effects of the War News upon Flour.
 Immense Sales and Heavy Rise
 Packard Vacates without a Struggle

WASHINGTON, April 25.
 A bill, forbidding pool selling, passed the New York Senate.
 The war news has put up flour in New York from 15 to 25 cents, and in exceptional cases, 50 cents. Wheat has improved from 7 to 10 cents. Rye, oats, pork and lard are also higher. Freighters were decidedly stronger.
 The news creates much excitement in Chicago. In grain and provisions, since the first of April, the cost of wheat has advanced 40 cents per bushel and flour, over \$1 per barrel. The sales are larger than within five years.
 A New Orleans special says: "Shortly after 11 o'clock, last evening, Packard had his forces, numbering over four hundred, assembled in review, in the corridor of the State House. He was escorted to their presence, where he made a short address, thanking them for their devotion, stating that the time had come to end the conflict, and bidding them adieu. The scene is described as being a very impressive one. At its conclusion, he was escorted to his carriage, when the majority of the police and guard evacuated the building. To day the Legislature will meet for the last time at the Odd Fellows' Hall, when it will repair to the State House, where it will adjourn sine die."

MIDNIGHT.
WASHINGTON, April 25.
 The Public Printer notifies the Postmaster-General that the appropriations for printing the postoffice blanks are exhausted.
 Grant visited Hayes to-day.
 With regard to the Solicitor of the Treasury, the *Republican* says: "It seems now, that the announcement of the change in the Solicitorship of the Treasury, was a little premature. Mr Talbot, the present incumbent, will not retire until about the 1st of June. Then, it is not positive who will be appointed to fill the vacancy. The name of Hon G Wiley Wells has been prominently mentioned in connection with the appointment, but Secretary Sherman says he has not yet come to any definite decision."

LOUISIANA.
The Whang Doodle Mourneth, and the Mountains of Hespriam Refuse to be Comforted.
NEW ORLEANS, April 25.—The State House was found in the possession of one Metropolitan this morning. The Nicholls police took unopposed possession.
 Packard closes his address to the Republicans of Louisiana as follows: "I therefore announce to you, that I am compelled to abstain, for the present, from all active assertion of my government. I waive none of my legal rights, but yield only to a superior force. I am not wholly discouraged by the fact that one by one the Republican State governments of the South have been forced to succumb to force, or fraud or policy.
 "The first State re-established after the war, is the last State whose government thus falls, and I believe it will be among the first to raise itself again to the plane of equal and honest representation. I advise that you maintain your party organization, and continue to battle for the rights of citizenship and free government; we strive for these and not for man or men. It grieves me, beyond expression, that the heroic efforts you have made, and the civil sufferings you have undergone to maintain Republican principles in Louisiana, have had this bitter ending. To those who have so gallantly stood by me in the long contest we have passed through, I tender my heartfelt thanks. To all, I counsel peace, patience and fortitude, and a firm trust that eventually right and justice will prevail."

FLORIDA.
Schooners Bound for North Carolina Lost.
JACKSONVILLE, April 25.—Schooner, Frank and Emily Rockport, for Wilmington, N. C., is lost. The Captain, Cobb, was picked up, but the balance of the crew, four in number, are supposed to be lost. Schooner, Chas H Kelly, from Cardenas to Wilmington, is abandoned.

NEW YORK.
The Indian War About Ended.
NEW YORK, April 25.—The Red Cloud agency telegram says: Gen Crook will leave to-morrow for Chicago, to consult Gen Sheridan upon Indian matters, and will also go to Washington.
 Couriers continue to arrive daily from Crazy Horse, reporting his approach to this agency with all his people. He will doubtless be here within a week, when the Sioux war may be considered at an end, as there will be no hostilities in this department, and the few remaining out under Sitting Bull in the department of Dakota, will find it impossible to protract hostilities.
 Worrell & Co., iron founders have failed.

THE EASTERN WAR.
Turko-Russian War Items.
 The advance force crossing the Pruth is fifty thousand including cavalry. The Turkish preparation for defending the Danube must be formidable in gunboats and iron clads.
 The Turkish iron clad squadron in the Bosphorus is ready to sail. Shots have been exchanged between belligerents in Asia.
 The Russians after crossing the Pruth took the direction of Galatz.
 The Russians will reach the Danube at Ismail Kilia and Vilaff.
RAGUSA, April 25.—Prince Nicholas and Staff, of Montenegro have gone to the Albanian frontier.
PARIS, April 25.—A majority of the Paris papers, particularly the *Republique* and *Francaise*, express the opinion that General Von Moltke's declaration in the German Parliament yesterday were not intended as hostile to France.
LONDON, April 25.—A Berlin special telegram to the second edition of the Times says: Gen Von Moltke's speech attracts as much attention as the Russian manifesto. It is generally assumed that Gen Von Moltke intended to tell the French that Germany is watching their movement; that she is acquainted with the peculiar disposition of their troops, that she cannot conceive their immense military efforts to aim at anything else save revenge at the first fitting opportunity, and warning her that Germany will not allow her to profit by Oriental troubles, for the possible pursuit of anti-Teutonic plans.
LONDON, April 25.—The London papers unanimously condemn the Russian manifesto. Even the *Daily News* which is more favorable to Russia, says We have to deal with a Russia in whose policy better or worse motives mingle—unfortunately the action of British government has tended to drive back nobler influences and foster a more ignoble and selfish one. The solitary action of Russia will almost necessarily be action primarily for Russian interest. The best hope of the Turkish Christians is the poor one of transference from Turkish to Russian despotism.
 The Standard considers the omission of a most striking and ominous circumstance which will cause and justify the darkest forebodings. It considers that the attempt of the manifesto to throw the responsibility of war upon Turkey, are beneath notice, and says: Never was there a more unfortunate specimen of imperial logic.
 The *Daily Telegraph* says: We have been tricked and duped by Tartar diplomacy, but in policy and action we shall not be so easily dealt with, for we shall now have for a single consideration national interest. The nation waits unanimously to support whatever measure the government may judge necessary to the safeguard of those interests.
 The Post says: The conduct of a despot and overbearing empire will be resented by every free people. For ourselves we may safely affirm that we shall not look on patiently while Cossacks trample down the Turkish constitution, and bar our own road to the East.
