THE EASTERN WAR

The Turks Burning Villages Opposite Bucharest.

Egypt Unwilling to support Turkey.

Bombardment of Fort St. Nicholas Resumed.

An Account of the Fight Before Kara.

England While Maintaining Neutrality Between the Eastern Belligerents, Expresses Sympathy for the Turks.

War Items.

RIO JANEIRO, May 3.—Coffee very animated; prices advancing.

Eight thousand Russians are expected at Bucharest to-morrow.

The Turks are burning the villages opposite Bucharest.

The declaration of a State war between Turkey and Roumania is imminent.

The Russians have stopped the manufacture of gas at their Black Sea ports, fearing a conflagration in case of a bombardment.

The great losses in the Russian advance guard is from fever and fatigue.

The Russian Consul General leaves Egypt Saturday.

The people in Egypt seem unwilling to support Turkey, either in men or money.

The bombardment of Fort St. Nicholas is resumed.

The Turkish posts on the Asiatic frontier have surrendered without a blow.

The Russian advance and the Turkish gunboats are within easy range in Roumania, but neither are inclined to open fire.

LONDON, May 3.—The Daily News Paris correspondent says a message from Viet-nam gives the following account of the battle of Kara: "The centre of the Russian army, forty thousand strong, under Melnikoff, attacked Mukhtar five miles from Kara, on the 29th. The Turks fought desperately. The Russians, supported by powerful artillery succeeded in dislodging them from their positions. Mukhtar called out all his reserves, and attempted, on the 30th to recover the lost ground with sixty thousand men, but was defeated and driven back under the guns at Kara. The Russian losses were considerable, and those of the Turks were enormous.

The City Council of Metz refused to vote money for the reception of the Emperor. The German inhabitants will unite with the garrison to celebrate his visit.

The Russians contradict the reports of their losses before Batoum.

The Russians have occupied the Island in the Danube near Ibrail, and the left bank of the river as far as the mouth of the river.

The Turkish squadron will shortly sail for Crete.

The Turks deny their defeat at Kara.

The Czar at Odessa to-day reviewed the troops.

The Russian Flotilla left Odessa for Kief to-day.

It is unrelatively reported that the bombardment of Odessa has commenced.

Fire opened this morning at Ibrail, the three Turkish monitors bombarding Ibrail drew off at noon on account of the weight of the Russian fire. The damage in Ibrail unknown.

The Times' Bucharest correspondent writing under date of April 29th, gives the following as a summary of the situation in regard to Roumania: When the Russians crossed the Pruth the Roumanians were nearly frightened out of their senses, for fear the Turks might execute their oft repeated threat of crossing the Danube. The government at Bucharest was loud in its professions of neutrality, publishing a manifesto declaring its intention to remain perfectly neutral, and announcing its resolution of withdrawing all its forces into the interior of the country. Despite this announcement by some mysterious fatality, the Roumanian troops and artillery seemed to gravitate to the Danube instead of the interior, as each day lessened the danger of the Turks crossing the Danube, and as the Russians continued to cross the frontier the course of the Roumanians rose, and within the last forty eight hours we have heard much less of Roumanian neutrality. A later dispatch from the correspondent says that seven Bulgarian have been arrested at Bucharest for signing an address to their fellow-countrymen.

Munkhtar Pasha's army is at Zet-kay, forty miles west of Kara.

LONDON, May 3.—In the House of Commons to-day, Lord Elcho placed on the Paper the following amendment to Mr. Gladstone's resolution: "That the House while anxious to

promote the well being of the Christian subjects of the Sultan, and all races under his rule, condemns the interference of a Foreign power by force of arms in the internal administration of the Ottoman empire, and this House is satisfied that Her Majesty's government while maintaining neutrality, as long as our interests are not affected by the war which Russia is waging against Turkey, will not fail to take such steps as would enable them, should occasion arise, promptly to protect our interest and maintain our empire in the East.

Thirty Miles of Wood Pavements in Washington Declared a Nuisance.

The President Will Come South

WASHINGTON, May 3.

A delegation of prominent citizens and influential business men called upon the President to ask the appointment of S. E. Middleton, of the firm of Middleton & Co., bankers, to the position of District Commissioner, to be made vacant by the resignation of Hon J. H. Kitchman. The petitions filed were signed by a large number of leading citizens, setting forth the fact that he has been a life-long resident of the District, and is thoroughly identified with its interests. Middleton was ten years cashier of the United States Treasury, and resigned to engage in his present business. The President remarked, that papers were already before him in the same interest, and were of a character to impress him favorably with the application made by the delegation.

No progress appears to have been made in the contest over the Louisiana Federal offices.

The friends of Wickersham, the former postmaster at Mobile, are not hopeless of his restoration.

Midnight.

WASHINGTON, May 3.

Richard C. Badger has been appointed District Attorney of the Eastern District of North Carolina.

The State Department has received official notice of a war between Turkey and Russia from the Turkish Minister here.

There is no present intention of removing Simon Wolf from his office of Registrar of Deeds.

Thirty miles of wood pavements, laid about four years ago, costing about five million dollars, are about being declared a nuisance.

Major-General Hancock is here, on a tour of inspection. He will visit Fortress Monroe.

The President will visit Richmond and Petersburg after the extra session of Congress, and may extend his trip further South.

Col John G. Stokes, of Alabama, known in journalism as "Spec," is dead.

NEW JERSEY.

Grave Charges Against a Presbyterian Minister in New Jersey—Fatal Accident.

TRENTON, May 3.—The New Brunswick Presbyterian assembled in this city this morning to consider the charges of heresy against Rev John Miller, a leading preacher of the Presbyterian church, in that he has published a book, denying the Trinity, and the immortality of the soul. Miller, in defining himself, said that no man in the church held to the Calvinistic doctrine with greater boldness and tenacity than he, but he did not believe in the Trinity. As to immortality of the soul, he avowed himself as opposed to the doctrine.

PATERSON, May 3.—A carriage returning from a funeral to-day, was struck by an engine, killing three of the occupants and fatally hurting two others. Both horses were killed.

PENNSYLVANIA.

President of the Union Banking Company a Defaulter.

PHILADELPHIA, May 3.—Jas A Hill, Cashier of the Union Banking Company, made affidavit before a Magistrate, charging N C Musselman, President, with embezzling moneys belonging to the Bank, and using it for speculation. Musselman has been arrested, and is held in a \$10,000 bail for further hearing.

NEW YORK.

More Investigations.

New York, May 3.—Secretary Sherman has ordered an investigation of the post office roof disaster. The Commission is sitting with closed doors. Architect Millet has been summoned.
