Hayes and Cabinet in Philadelphia.

WASHINGTON, May 9. Jas. D. Kennedy and Jas. M. Vance report an interview with the Postmaster-General, who spoke highly of Col. Parker's management of the New Orleans Post Office, and assured them that there was no probability of any change. The friends of Marshal Pitkin express some uneasiness this morning.

Distribution of Troops.

WASHINGTON, May 9. We have to face one hundred thousand Mormons. There are about fifteen thousand Gentiles in Utah. Salt Lake City has a population of twenty thousand, of whom, perhaps, four thousand are gentiles. Many of them are quietly arranging for the removal of their families at the first sign of an outbreak.

London, May 9.

A dispatch to the Reuter telegram company from Erzeroum, dated 9 o'clock Tuesday night, says: The Russians are surrounding Soghale, and concentrating for attack on Mukhtar Pasha's position at Bardiz and Yenikay. The Russian force which occupied Bayazidin, is now advancing in the direction of Khamoniz and Antob, leaving Karkeliss and Alaskert on their right. Bayazid has now been placed under the control of the Russian's prefect of police.

Bucharest, May 9.

The statement that the Roumanian army will probably be incorporated with the Russian army or placed under a Russian commander, is officially contradicted. London, May 9.—Mr. Layard telegraphs Earl Derby that Turkey has extended the time for neutral vessels to enter and leave the blockaded ports of the Black Sea to seven days. Vessels may enter until the 15th inst., and depart until the 17th inst.

Galatz, May 9.

Early this morning the Russian batteries re-commenced cannonading Ghiracet and at 9 this morning a brisk musketry fire was audible at all points. BUCHAREST, May 9.—P. M.—The artillery engagement was renewed with vigor late yesterday afternoon, between the Turkish batteries at Widdin and the Roumanian batteries at Malafat which only ceased at night fall. The barracks and Custom House at Kalafat were destroyed, and the church injured. Widdin was set on fire. The Turks again fired to-day, but the Russian batteries were silent.

St. Petersburg, May 9.

The Grand Duke Nicholas telegraphs as follows: Kischeneff, May 7.—All is well. The movement of the troops proceeds unhindered. The Turks are entirely passive. The health of the troops is excellent.

Great Gas Explosion. POTTSVILLE, May 9.—A great explosion of gas occurred this morning in the Madesville mines, near St. Clair. A number of men are imprisoned in the mines, and at present it seems impossible to rescue them. POTTSVILLE, May 9.—It is reported from St. Clair that thirty men are imprisoned in the Madesville mine.
