LOUISIANA WILL BECOME REPUBLICAN.

REDUCTION OF THE ARMY—NAVAL OFFICERS CLAMORING FOR PAY.

WASHINGTON, May 10.

The proclamation of independence, and a simultaneous declaration of war against Turkey was agreed upon in private confidence by the Senators and Deputies. Bradino, President of the Ministry was present at the conference.

It is thought Russia will not reply to Derby's note. The Russian telegraph agency however foreshadows a reply which concludes: "The English Cabinet cannot extricate itself from this dilemma, except by proclaiming that England is the first Mussulman power in the world, and that she consequently wishes for the maintenance of the Turkish dominion over Christians, even at the cost of their extermination. We hold the English nation in too great esteem to believe it would sanction such a policy."

Turkish gunboats seized four vessels in the Danube, sailing under the Greek flag.

A Turkish monitor bombarded Stanton ten hours.

A French gunboat is at Salina, the mouth of the Danube, to protect the French interest in the Daboudshea.

The Turkish Commander in Chief is at Shumla.

It is reported that the Roumanian forces strengthened by a Russian division, will form the right wing of the Russian army. A vigorous contest is expected between Kalafat and Widdin as the Russians propose to cross there.

The Daily Telegraph's special from Bucharest reports that several Russian deserters, nearly all of whom were Jews, were shot at Atty during the week.

It is said the Chief Rabbi at Constantinople has ordered prayers to be offered for the success of the Turks, in all the synagogues of Roumania.

LIVERPOOL, May 10.—Williams & Gui on line steamer Dakota, which sailed from Liverpool yesterday for N. Y., is ashore on the main land inside of Anglesey, an island of North Wales. Her crew and passengers were safely landed. A tug has gone to the scene of the disaster.

The Dakota's passengers will sail on Saturday on the steamer Wisconsin. It is feared the Dakota will prove a total loss.

PARIS, May 10.—To-day being Ascension Day, is observed as a holiday.

LONDON, May 10.—The Daily Telegraph announces that reinsurance are being effected on the over due Inman line steamer City of Brussels, for 15 guineas per cent premium.

A Reuter telegram from Constantinople dated Wednesday evening says: "No news of any engagement in Armenia has been received here."

The Czar is said to be alarmed at the formation of the Polish legion at Constantinople, and has ordered the Government General at Warsaw, to exercise the greatest vigilance to prevent Russian Poles joining the legion. All mitigations of the state of siege in Poland enforced since the insurrection of 1863, will be revoked. The Berlin papers announce that leading Polish politicians at a secret meeting at Lucerne, resolved on the establishment of a recruiting bureau all over Poland with the hope of raising an army of eighty thousand men. Six thousand have left already for Turkey. The national committee has appointed Count Ruziszeki as a delegate to Constantinople.

The news of the rising of a tribe in Caucasus is important, and seems to indicate serious trouble for Russians, because the clans which have risen are in the immediate neighborhood of the high road from Tiflis to Vladivostok, which is the only means of communication between Russia and Transcaucasia.

LIVERPOOL, May 10.—The Post's London correspondent says: When Mr Cross boasted on Monday of the entire unity of the Cabinet, he was indulging in a flight of imagination. The truth is, nominal unity was only restored Saturday, and this result was obtained after an angry discussion in the Cabinet and by the threatened resignation of four of its members. Lord Beaconsfield was in favor of a violent and sensational policy. The four members to whom the country owe the final decision of the government in favor of neutrality, are Lord Salisbury, Sir Stafford Northcote, Lord Conarnson and Mr Cross. They declared they would not support a warlike policy, as their retirement would break up the government. The Prime Minister and his warlike colleagues were compelled to submit. Thus a sort of unity has been patched up for the present, and the government in the meantime is committed to a policy of neutrality. It should not however be forgotten that this policy is provisional, and the whole Cabinet recognize that intervention may become necessary.

VIRGINIA.

Western Business Men to be Entertained at the Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs—Receiver for the Petersburg RE

RICHMOND, May 10.—Delegations from the commercial and municipal bodies left this morning to meet the Western business men at the Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs, where they are to be entertained to-night by Col. Peyton. They arrive here Friday evening.

In the United Circuit Court at Norfolk, Judge Hughes presiding, the motion for a Receiver for the Petersburg Railroad was granted, and Maj R F Pegram, of Petersburg, was appointed.

PENNSYLVANIA.

The Permanent Exhibition—Philadelphia in Holiday Attire

PHILADELPHIA, May 10.—The city is in holiday attire. Crowds are on the way to the opening of the permanent Exhibition. Public and private buildings are covered with bunting. Horse cars and other vehicles are similarly decorated. At one o'clock the President and party, escorted by the first city troop, proceeded to the Exhibition grounds. The City Council's committee, General Grant, Gov. Hartranft, and other officials, left the Union League House at the same hour to attend the ceremonies.

NEW ORLEANS, May 10.—The Southern Baptist Convention met this morning, and the following officers were elected: J P Boyce, D D, of Kentucky President; Jas C Furman, D D, of South Carolina; T G Jones, D D, of Tennessee, W C Crane, D D, of Texas, and T J Evans, D D, of Virginia, Vice-Presidents; W E Tanner, of Virginia, and E T Gregory, of Alabama, Secretaries.

Corner-Stone Laying.

CHATTANOOGA, May 10.—The exercises of laying the corner-stone of the monument dedicated to the Confederate dead, took place to-day. The Masonic Fraternity and a detachment of United States troops participated in the ceremonies. People from all parts of the Union joined in decorating the graves amidst the utmost harmony and good feeling.
