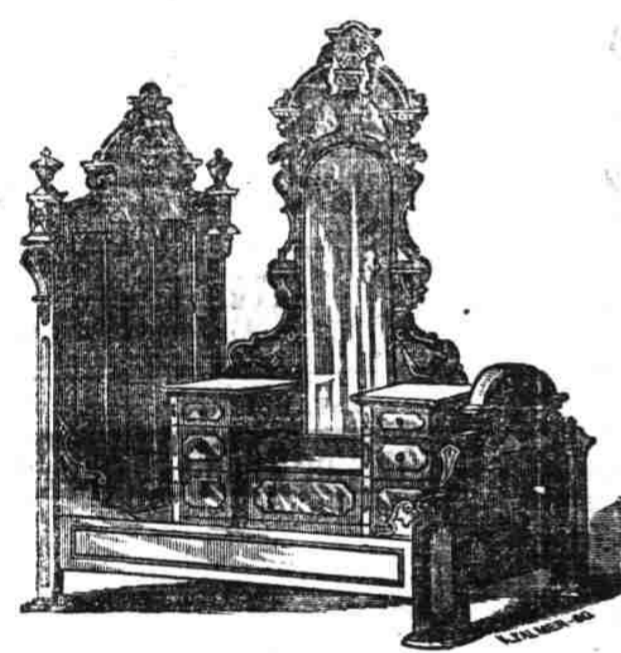

THE EASTERN WAR

The Burial Bill Passed in England.

A Delay in the Russian Advance.

The Needle Gun a Power.

England Desirous of Fixing the Limit of Russia's Military Operations.

Russians Repulsed.

War Items.

LONDON, May 18.—The House of Lords passed the burial bill permitting other than the Church of England service to be read in church yards, 65 to 60. The government opposed the bill.

The Standard's Berlin dispatch says: The good understanding now existing between France and Germany will be seriously endangered should the clerical party obtain power in France.

The Earl of Orkney died to-day, aged 74 years.

PARIS, May 18.—President MacMahon has announced that his Cabinet is composed of entirely new material. The Duke de Broglie is chief. M. Fourton, Minister of the Interior is suspected of strong Napoleonic tendencies, and understands the management of elections.

The Russian army corps at Odessa was sent to the Crimea to prevent the spread of the Tartar insurrection.

Many Mollah's accompany the Turks to Caucasus to incite the Caucasians to a holy war. The Sultan has determined to admit Christians into the army. A draft of 200,000 will be made, regardless of race or creed.

It is raining heavily on the Danube. The Times' Berlin dispatch says: The Russian movement of concentration upon Kars from Pati, Akhltzik, Alexandropol and Irwan, has come to a stand still, a few marches from the frontier. The delay is partly occasioned by the necessity of establishing stores for victualling the troops on Turkish soil, and partly by the Russian Generals recognizing the change effected in the conditions of the warfare by the universal adoption of the needle gun, and an attack in massed columns, such as the Russians undertook the other day near Batoum, was in former times a rule successful; now any such feats are out of the question. The needle gun even in Turkish hands will not chiefly to rely upon their artillery. It is intended to establish a sort of Mutual Insurance company against Turkish shells in Russian seaport towns.

LONDON, May 18.—A Reuter's dispatch dated May 15th, says: "An attack of the Russians on Andahaa has been bravely repulsed by the Turks." The Times' Vienna correspondent says: "According to the on dit of the Russians themselves, they intend going down once more to Adrianople, and having got there to inform the Powers that having accomplished their task they now call upon Europe to consult upon what should be done next. The same correspondent in discussing the report that England is endeavoring to induce Russia to fix a limit to her military operations, says that it is not thought impossible that Count Schouvaloff may endeavor to induce the Russian government to give such assurance about its ultimate designs as may serve to allay as much as possible, all apprehensions regarding them, that have arisen in England, but 'tis very much to be doubted that the way of doing this will be an attempt to fix the line of demarcation to military operations."

LIVERPOOL, May 18.—The market for yarns and fabrics at Manchester is firmer. An advance is demanded which buyers refuse.

PARIS, 18.—A message from President MacMahon has just been received in the Chamber, proroguing the sitting one month.

LONDON, May 18.—A special to the Telegraph from Erzeroum May 17th says: The Russians have just attempted to bombard Kars with four heavy siege guns. They miscalculated the range, and the shots flew over the town without any damage. Kars replied briskly, and the assailants were compelled to retire, subsequently again attempted the erection of siege works. Mukhtar Pasha has lost some munitions in consequence of having been suddenly attacked on the flanks.

The advance of 2,500 Circassians from the Van has been momentarily checked by the enemy.

The Russians are falling back from Kars. The Kurds and Circassians are advancing on the Russian left from Van and Erivar.

WASHINGTON!

Republicans Calling Each Other Bad Names.

Democrats or New Northern Men for Southern Offices.

Key's Contemplated Appointment.

Appointments—Accused of Diverting Public Funds.

WASHINGTON, May 18.

The rival Republicans for office in the South are piling up charges against each other. It needs no Democratic remonstrance to exclude the present set. If what they say of each other is to be believed, not one of the present applicants is a fit person to hold an office of honor, trust or profit. The President is beginning to see but two means of disposing of the Southern offices. One is to give them to Democrats, and the other is to send down new Northern men. The present Republicans of the South, native and imported, cannot endure each other, and promise to be a feeble foundation upon which to construct the proposed old time Whig-native-Republican and colored man's party.

Postmaster-General Key is about to give the post office at Corinth, Mississippi, to Maj. Jeff. Wafford, Maj. Wafford was Chief of Artillery to Gen. Stephen D. Lee while he fought in Mississippi.

MIDNIGHT

WASHINGTON, May 18.

Geo. L. Morton has been appointed Supervising Inspector of Steamboats of the 10th District, with headquarters at New Orleans.

There was a full Cabinet to-day, excepting the Secretary of War.

Governor Potts, of Montana, is accused of bribery and corruption, but it is said the charges have been dismissed.

They say that ex-Attorney-General Taft, diverted the funds of the Bureau of Justice from judicial to political purposes. Marshal Douglass asked for \$6000 to run the District Courts to July 1st, but was allowed only \$5000.

The Star says: "G. Willey Wells, of Mississippi, will be Solicitor of the Treasury Department after June 30th. Gen. Butler authorized Wells, because he did not support Ames in Mississippi."

Secretary Sherman has appointed Second Assistant Secretary French Col. Casey's engineer, and placed him in charge of public buildings, and Supervising Architect.

NEW YORK.

Commodore Garrison III—One of Hayes' Letters—He Pledges the Speakership of the House to Garfield—Chamberlain turns up.

NEW YORK, May 17.—Commodore Garrison is seriously ill.

The Times publishes an extract from a letter from Hayes to Garfield before the Senatorial election, asking Garfield to withdraw from the Senatorial contest. The President then expressed his belief that Garfield's election as Speaker was probable, and assured him of his willingness, and his power; to accomplish that result. Garfield, upon receipt of this letter, sent a telegram to a number of the Ohio Legislators, withdrawing his name from the caucus.

Ex-Governor Chamberlain, of South Carolina, was sworn in as an attorney and counselor of the New York Bar, to-day.

WOODBRIDGE, Mo., May 18.—A three hundred thousand dollars fire is covered by King, Queen, Main and Court streets.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., May 18.—The people have tendered an eloquent invitation to the President, members of the Cabinet and their wives to be present to assist in decorating the soldiers' graves.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 18.—Governor Robinson has vetoed the New York City Omnibus Charter Bill.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., May 18.—It is feared that the schooner "G. P. Pomeroy" from Sanilla river, Ga., bound for Bath, Maine, loaded with timber, is lost off Hatteras.
