THE EASTERN WAR

The Capture of Ardahan a Great Relief to the Russians before Batoum.

The Independence of Servia can only be Settled by the Great Powers.

Destination of Russian Vessels in American Waters.

Speeches of Thursday's Demonstrations in Constantinople.

Another Turkish Monitor (Gone) - Blown up by the Russians.

A Battle Imminent

War Items.

The Times' Bucharest correspondent says: Present indications strengthen the conclusion that no important events will occur on the Danube till the whole front line is in position on the bank of the river. A strong corps will be formed on the extreme right, composed of the Roumanian army and two Russian divisions. This force will move up the Turkish side of the river to Timce and turn the left flank of the Balkan line, by a movement on Sapir and Philibopolis. This column would leave a friendly country on the right from which to draw supplies. The Russian army which captured Ardahan was seventy thousand strong. The position of this force reinforced the Russians before Batoum, which was similarly imperiled.

Russia will respect the neutrality of Servia. Her independence is a matter which can only be settled by the great powers.

Some Russian vessels from American waters will return to Cronstadt, others will anchor off Gibraltar to intercept vessels with port of call for Turkey. A column from Yan and a column of Circassians from Erzeroum are pushing forward to cut off the Russian advance in that quarter. A Turkish iron-clad destroyed the Turkish ship at Nikopolis, driving the Russians out, who left forty dead.

VIENNA, May 26. - The Abend Blatt says: Thursday's demonstration in Constantinople assumed a very serious proportion. Many thousands of people, led by armed sofas, presented themselves before the palace to demand the dismissal of the ministry, and the recall of Mehmed Pasha. The Sultan fled to a fortress on the Asiatic side, and the military dispersed the crowd, wounding many. The Christian head of the city, and many Europeans took refuge on board of a ship. Consternation was general.

LONDON, May 26. - A dispatch to the Reuter Telegram Company from St. Petersburg says: "A telegram received here announces that the Russians blew up a position on the Danube at 3 o'clock this morning, by means of a torpedo."

A dispatch to the Times says: The proclamation of a holy war looks like a step to the popular demand, which has been growing louder daily that the Sultan join the army. The proposal that the Sultan quit Constantinople has naturally raised the question whether it is safe to leave behind a parliament, which is becoming more difficult to manage, and which, moreover, has the whole of Constantinople at its disposal. It is no wonder, therefore, that Constantinople, during the last few days, has been filled with rumors of an impending dissolution, a coup d'etat, &c. It is felt even at the palace that the Sultan's incapacity needs to be recalled, yet a fresh attempt to recall the Chamber in this case directly influences the course of affairs may mature the Porte's resolution to check interference, by proclamation at least.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 26. - Intelligence has been received here that the Russian bombardment of Kara has slackened.

The Russians continue to advance on Erzeroum, and a battle is expected shortly. The Russian right wing is at Olti, and the left at Van.

The Russian attempt to throw the bridge over the river before the Turkish lines at Batoum, was repulsed. A detachment of Russians, with two guns, on Tuesday attacked Akheban, a village in Akaba and Ideak near Batoum. The Akheban Jochies assembled all their available force and re-

pulsed the Russian, who lost 150 killed and many wounded. A Russian Major and four Captains were found among the slain. The Turkish loss was seven killed and eleven wounded.

ERZROUM, May 26. - The Russian bombardments of Karadagh and Takmaz peris, and outer works of Kara, are now only carried on at intervals, the Turkish batteries replying.

MOSCOW, May 26. - Intelligence from Eupatoria, in the Crimea, announces that most of the families belonging to the wealthier class have fled to Simfopol, and other towns in the interior. All shops are closed. The roads are deserted. All merchant ships have left, and the smaller vessels have been sunk or bottled ashore. In the town there is a perceptible want of provisions.

Sixty thousand infantry and five thousand horsemen are concentrated at Shumla, and held in constant readiness to move. The elite of the Turkish officers are there. The condition of affairs within the quadrilateral, composed of Varna, Shumla, Rutschuk, and Silistria, is satisfactory.

The Turkish army in Asia, however, is spoken of as deficient in everything but bravery and enthusiasm.

Morton Advises a Solid North.

WASHINGTON, May 26.

Morton's letter concludes: "As the Democrats have acquired a solid South by force, the Republicans should acquire a solid North by their vigilance and the eternal justice of their cause. Northern Republicans are now admonished that they can endure no divisions that will endanger their success."

"Should the North, by unhappy division, be divided, and they fall a prey to the solid confederate, South, rebellion will have been suppressed in vain, and the fruits of the war lost, and our last condition will be worse than the first."

Ridgely O Powers has been retained as internal revenue collector for Mississippi.

Col. Jno N Staples, of North Carolina, desires to be heard that he is here on professional business, and that his visit to the President with Judge Settle, Gen Leach and others, had no political significance, and the following paragraph in regard to it, is unauthorized and untrue:

"The conference lasted two hours and a half. During that time, the Democrats gave the President a most cordial and personal assurance of their support, and predicted the establishment of an administration party in North Carolina, which would soon effectually rescue the State from Bourbon control. It is now the intention of those who are leading this movement, to begin next year at the political election with an organization to be called the administration party, as opposed to the Bourbon Democrats."

MIDNIGHT

WASHINGTON, May 26.

The Attorney General has gone to Boston for a few days.

It is not considered necessary at the war department that additional troops should be sent to Utah. The official statement from there does not sustain any warlike demonstrations on the part of the Mormons, which are reported in the papers.

S. P. Smith, of Charlotte, N. C., is here, and is pressed for Commissioner to the Paris Exposition.

The Star says: "Senator Morton's letter is seriously commented upon by the politicians. The Radical-Republicans say that it cannot be dignified into first-class news. It is generally considered as a double ender, susceptible of many constructions, that one wishes to place upon it."

Warner M. Bateman, of Cincinnati declines the Solicitorship of the Treasury Department. This is the office that Chamberlain declined.

Wm. B. Jones received his commission as Postmaster at Nashville, today.

Frank Gilbert has been appointed Assistant Treasurer of the United States at Chicago.

Secretary Sherman has directed the Assistant Treasurer at New York to sell one million in gold, May 31st. A third-class buoy, painted black, marks the wreck of a Holland bark, lying in the western edge of Ship Is and Channel, in the Gulf of Mexico.

FLORIDA

Justice Bradley Grants an Injunction Against Gov Drew in Cases of W. C. and F. C. P. and M. Railroads - Arrested for Libel

JACKSONVILLE, May 26. - Justice Bradley has granted an injunction, restraining Gov. Drew from selling certain railroads for the payment of the interest on the bond. The Western N. C., Florida Central, Jacksonville, Pensacola, and Mobile railroads are implicated. Two million dollars are involved. Jas. B. Stewart, the lawyer notorious as the recipient witness in the Credit Mobilier and Blaine bond cases, has had Chas. D. Willard, of Washington, D. C., arrested for libel. Willard has been released on bail.
