**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.**  
**THE EASTERN WAR**  
A London Snail Box for Ulysses.  
Tidal Wave on the West Coast of South America.  
Eight Hundred Lives Lost.  
Circassian Cavalry en route for Siberia.  
Grecian Ministry Favoring War.  
Russians Again Repulsed.  
Peace Rumors Still Afloat.  
Roumanian Ministry Adjourned.  
War Items.

LONDON, May 31.—The Standard says that the corporation of the City of London will tender Grant the freedom of the city in the shape of a gold snuff box.  
PANAMA, 25.—A tidal wave has swept the coast from Cillao to Chill. Eight hundred lives were lost.  
CONSPIRATORS have seized the monitor Haugar, the finest vessel of the Peruvian navy, and put to sea.  
Hobart Pasha has left Constantinople for the Black Sea.  
THIRTEEN traders filled with Circassian cavalry belonging to the Russian army passed over the Maldranian railway in one day on their way back to Russia. These squadrons will be disbanded.  
SHIEK UL ISLAM found means to let these troops know that a holy war had been declared. The regiments of these discontented troops will be sent to Siberian garrisons.  
RUSSIA has paid Roumanians three millions roubles. More has been demanded, and refused.  
TWO Austrian monitors have reached Semlin to watch Servia.  
THE new Greek Ministry will favor war. Much uneasiness prevails at Athens.  
THE German papers continue semi-official intimations that the end of the war is approaching.  
THE Roumanian batteries repulsed the fifth attempt of the Turks to establish a battery opposite Isalaz.  
TWO Austrian monitors are within reach of Belgrade.

THE Daily Telegraph has the following from Batoum, under date of May 30th: The Russians yesterday attacked the Turkish positions here, but notwithstanding the large force which the Russians brought to attack, and their persisting against the galling fire of the Ottoman artillery and infantry, they were finally repulsed, leaving great numbers of dead and wounded on the field. The engagement lasted ten hours, during which time several close combats took place.  
THE Daily Telegraph's Erzeroum special confirms the report that the Russian left wing was repulsed in the attack on Karakilissa.  
VIENNA, May 31.—The Tagblatt states that Mukhtar Pasha has been dismissed from his command, and will be court-martialed for representing he had an equipped army of 68,000 men, whereas he had only 20,000 at his disposal. Malversation on an enormous scale is said to have been discovered.  
BUCHAREST, May 31.—Sixty Russian siege guns are expected at Kalafat to strengthen the batteries there.  
ROUMANIA, May 31.—The Ministry are in trouble over the paper currency project. They have been unable to get a quorum for the past two days, and have therefore consented to adjourn without debate.  
LONDON, May 31.—A special dispatch to the News from Ploiesti, says: Though the rains have ceased, the Danube is high, owing to the melting snow in the mountains near its source, an inundation is feared near Olteniza which would oblige the Russians to move their batteries there.  
THE Crisis' Bucharest dispatch has the following: It is understood that a small detached column under selected officers, and having widely outlying objectives will form part of the Russian scheme of operations, after crossing the Danube.  
SOME Bashu Bazonks crossed the Danube between Kalorack and the Jalomitzas. They captured some Roumanian militiamen and cut off the calves of their legs.

THE News' Alexandria dispatch says: The Egyptian transport steamers have not yet started with the Egyptian contingent of troops for Turkey. The strike of English engineers which at first delayed their departure, has been settled, but the Russian and Roumanian gunboats, carrying twenty (20) tons of gun is waiting for them in the Mediterranean.  
A special dispatch from Paris to the Times says that the Turkish iron clads are expected at Alexandria on the 4th

of June, to escort the Egyptian transport.  
ERZEROU, May 29.—All is quiet at Kars. Heavy rains continue, preventing operations.

**WASHINGTON!**  
Going for the Beast.  
Ben Butler's Spoons Thrown into His Teeth.  
A Batch of Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—MacVeagh's letter to Butler, denounces the main statements of Butler's letter to Pliekin, as base and cowardly falsehoods, has this sentence: "I had no money of my own to spare, and it is only military commandant of New Orleans, who in time of war, can safely appropriate any considerable quantity of the property of others, to his own use."  
THE Attorney General has returned. There were fifty dismissals to-day from the bureau of printing and engraving. Three chiefs of divisions have been removed, and their places will be filled by new men.  
THE consul at Havre, reports mutiny aboard the brig, "C. C. Sweeney" of Herrington, Me. On May 16, a few hours after leaving Havre, six men refused to obey the mate, H. Harris. They killed him, and arrested the captain and second mate, who barricaded themselves in the captain's cabin.  
GENERAL Cronly, of Ohio, whom Hayes tendered the mission to the Sandwich Islands, has not yet accepted or declined.  
ALL representations and papers regarding the Chisholm tragedy, have been referred to the Attorney General.

KNOXVILLE, May 31.—The train from Atlanta to Chattanooga, with the Postal Committee aboard, made the 138 miles over the Kennebec route, in three hours and thirty minutes. They left Chattanooga this morning, and made a run to this point, 112 miles, in two hours and forty-five minutes. After meeting the citizens here, they left for Richmond, over the Kennebec route, where the party will arrive at six o'clock to-morrow evening.

**VIRGINIA.**  
The Norfolk Cotton Exchange Report  
NORFOLK, May 31.—The Exchange report on the cotton crop, has thirty-four replies from twenty-four North Carolina counties, which make the average slightly under last year's. The weather has been decidedly unfavorable. Replanting is very generally necessary, making the crop two or three weeks late. Labor is plentiful, and cheaper. Much cotton land is going into corn.

**ILLINOIS.**  
False Report About Mr. Sittling Ball.  
CHICAGO, May 31.—Lieutenant Clark telegraphs General Sheridan, from the Red Cloud Agency, that after full investigation, he considers the defeat absolutely false. Sittling Ball could not have been in the vicinity of the reported fight.

**TENNESSEE.**  
Horace F. Smith, a Railroad Agent, Drowned.  
MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 31.—Horace F. Smith, General Freight Agent of the Memphis division of the Louisville, Nashville & Great Southern Railroad, was accidentally drowned in the river here last night.

**CALIFORNIA.**  
Indians Driven Back into the West.  
SAN FUEGO, May 31.—The Indians who killed the mail carrier within three miles of Camp Bowie, Arizona, were driven back West, by the squad of soldiers who pursued them.

**MARYLAND.**  
Heavy Fire.  
BALTIMORE, May 31.—W. H. Brown & Brothers, drug store, on South Sharp street, was burned. Loss, ninety thousand dollars.

**CONNECTICUT.**  
Death from Hydrophobia.  
HARTFORD, May 31.—Monsieur F. A. Alreghat, an instructor of French, who was bitten by a dog on April the 8th, died this morning of hydrophobia.
